NDU Women Peace and Security Student Research and Writing Competition

BACKGROUND

The United States Strategy on Women, Peace, and Security (WPS) seeks to increase women's participation in conflict prevention and create conditions for long-term peace. In June 2020, the Department of Defense published its first WPS strategic framework and implementation plan. UN Security Council Resolution 1325 adopted a set of seven resolutions that call for increased participation of women in peace and security related initiatives, such as women's participation in conflict resolution and peacebuilding. They emphasize the active role women play in conflict prevention and the need for support of these roles, making provision for the protection of women and girls from violence during and after conflict. States are implementing these women, peace, and security resolutions around the globe through their domestic, security, military, and foreign policies. As of August 2023, 104 countries have developed National Action Plans to implement the WPS Agenda, including the United States.

CRITERIA FOR SELECTION

As part of NDU's commitment to implement the WPS Strategy, students are invited to participate in the annual WPS research and writing competition. Winning papers will address one or more of the following areas:

How a gendered understanding, perspective and/or approach⁴ relate to: Advancing peace, national security, economic and social development, or international cooperation; Conflict resolution; Peacebuilding; Conflict prevention; Protection of rights; Protection from gender-based harms; Protection of women and girls from violence; Access to relief and recovery; Humanitarian Assistance/Disaster Relief; Leadership; Counterterrorism or Irregular warfare; Gender equality in military, law enforcement, and other security services.

RESEARCH PAPER GUIDELINES

- Candidates must be enrolled at NDU during the 2022-2023 academic year.
- Submissions must reflect graduate-level writing, be free of errors, and suitable for publication.
- Submission Deadline to one of the Committee Members is May 1, 2023.
- Submission format:
 - o Include a cover sheet with the student's name, paper title and if previously written for an NDU course, state the course number and title.
 - Submissions should be typed, double-spaced, using 12-point Times New Roman font, with page numbers, one-inch margins and between 12-20 pages, exclusive of bibliography, appendices, annexes, or narrative footnotes/endnotes.
 - Source footnotes or endnotes are included in the page-count and should be in accordance with *The Chicago Manual of Style*, 17th ed.

JUDGING & NOTIFICATION

Submissions will be read and judged by the WPS Research and Writing Competition Selection Committee. The authors of the top three papers will be invited to give 5-minute oral presentations to the Selection Committee. The Committee will notify the winner no later than May 19, 2023.

AWARD

The winner will be awarded a Certificate of Achievement signed by NDU-P and an award from the NDU Foundation. The selection committee reserves the right to award an Honorable Mention to a runner up. Winners may also be invited by the Military Women's Memorial or other partners to present their research to a wider audience.
