CARNS, MICHAEL P.C., GENERAL

U.S. AIR FORCE (RETIRED)

General Carns graduated from the U.S. Air Force Academy in 1959 as a member of its first class with a Bachelor of Science degree. Following pilot training, General Carns served as a Flight Instructor at Laredo AFB, Texas. In 1961, he was appointed Aide to the Commander, Air Reserve Records Center, Denver, Colorado, then Aide to the Commander, 4th Air Force Reserve Region, Randolph AFB, Texas, followed by duty as Air

Operations Officer at the same base. Following graduation from Harvard University in 1967, with a masters degree in Business Administration, he was then assigned to the 476th Tactical Fighter Squadron, George AFB, California, then the 40th Tactical Fighter Squadron, Eglin AFB, Florida. In August 1968, he was assigned to the 469th Tactical Fighter Squadron, Korat Royal Thai AFB, Thailand, where he flew 200 combat missions in the F-4E. In 1969, he was assigned to Air Force headquarters as a Plans and Programs Officer, and later, as Aide to the Air Force Chief of Staff. This was followed by tours at Torrejon AB, Spain; SHAPE Headquarters, Belgium; and, RAF Bentwaters, England. Subsequent assignments included: command of the 354th Tactical Fighter Wing, Myrtle Beach AFBSC; command of the 57th Fighter Weapons Wing, Nellis AFB, NV; Director of Operations, J-3, Rapid Deployment Joint Task Force, later redesignated U.S. Central Command; and Deputy Chief of Staff for Plans and, later, Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations and Intelligence, HQ Pacific Air Forces, Hickam AFB, HI. In 1986, he took command of 13th Air Force, Clark Air Base, Philippines, and was assigned in 1987 as Deputy in Chief and Chief of Staff, U.S. Pacific Command, Camp H.M. Smith, HI. In 1989, he became Director of the Joint Staff, Washington, DC. In 1991, he became Vice Chief of Staff of the Air Force, the position he held until retirement in 1994.

After retirement, General Carns served as the Managing Director of a small healthcare firm for one year (94-95), followed by over four years (until Feb 00) as Executive Director of a New York-based policy research firm specializing in Pacific Rim security, international capital flows and international energy demands. Currently, General Carns serves on a number of DoD panels, boards and task forces, boards of directors of corporations, and consults for a number of businesses.

General Carns is a member of the Board of Directors of: Rockwell Collins, Inc, Cedar Rapids, IA; Mykrolis Corporation, Billerica, MA; WebGen Systems, Boston, MA; Engineered Support Systems Inc, St Louis, MO., and Precision Remotes Inc, Richmond, CA. He holds appointments as: member, U S Comptroller General (GAO) Board of Advisors; Member, Department of Defense Science Board; Member, Board of Advisors, National Security Agency (NSA); Senior Fellow, National Defense University (NDU), Department of Defense; Member, National Geospatial Agency (NGA) Forum; Member, Threat Reduction Advisory Council, Defense Threat Reduction Agency (DTRA); Member, Board of Visitors, Air University; Chairman, Board of Visitors, Air Force Institute of Technology; Member, Defense Science Study Group, Institute for Defense Analysis; member, Board of Trustees, Monterey Institute of International Studies; and, member, Board of Trustees, Falcon Foundation, an educational foundation.

In his various capacities, General Carns maintains extensive international contacts with senior level government, university academic and business officials. In the past year, he has had several on-site dialogues with governmental and business leaders in China, Japan, Republic of Korea, United Kingdom, France, Belgium, Bahrain, Kuwait, Egypt, Mongolia, Afghanistan, Iraq, Australia and India, with additional visits planned to Europe, the Pacific and the Middle East/Gulf in 2004.

General Carns has authored and published a number of articles on current issues, including such topics as the need to substantially alter the military acquisition process, the benefits of privatizing military logistics functions, the lagging role of the United States in space, the role of the military warfighter, the eroding effectiveness of US nuclear deterrence; the evolving role of military force, the evolving nature of deterrence, and most recently applying energy efficiency standards to weapons system effectiveness.

Stephen R. Pietropaoli

Senior Director, CAPSTONE



Stephen Pietropaoli reported to the National Defense University in November of 2009 to become Director of the CAPSTONE, KEYSTONE, and PINNACLE programs, which were created to prepare senior military and civilian leadership to better deal with the challenges of working in a joint environment. In an increasingly interconnected world, joint operations are required to meet rapidly evolving national security needs. These programs examine major issues affecting national security decision-making, Inter-agency issues, military strategy, joint/combined doctrine, interoperability, and the international implications of national policy.

Prior to reporting to NDU, Pietropaoli was the Executive Director of the Navy League of the United States, a position he assumed in October of 2003, coincident with retirement after 26 years of naval service. Founded in 1902 with the support of President Theodore Roosevelt, the Navy League is a powerful voice for a strong maritime component to our national defense. The Navy League's missions include keeping the public and elected officials informed about the importance of seapower to national security and economic prosperity and providing direct support to sea service personnel and their families through our 250 Councils worldwide.

As the Navy's Chief of Information from August 2000 until July 2003, Pietropaoli was responsible for all aspects of the Navy's public affairs program, and was the principal public affairs counselor to the Secretary of the Navy and the Chief of Naval Operations. Prior to his promotion to flag rank, Pietropaoli was the special assistant for public affairs to Army Generals Hugh Shelton and John Shalikashvili during their tenures as Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

A 1977 graduate of Cornell University, Pietropaoli began his career aboard surface combatants in the Atlantic Fleet, serving as electrical officer aboard the destroyer USS HAWKINS and as anti-submarine warfare officer aboard the frigate USS BOWEN, completing two deployments to the Mediterranean and one circumnavigation of South America as part of the UNITAS exercises with South American navies.

Following his initial sea tour, Pietropaoli reported to the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps at the University of Pennsylvania as engineering instructor and freshman advisor. While there, Pietropaoli was selected for re-designation as a public affairs specialist, one of only 200 such officers in the Navy. Reporting to the Office of Information, he spent the next three years on the Navy's national news desk in the Pentagon, working daily with the Pentagon press corps and media from around the world.

After completing a master's degree in Broadcast Journalism at American University, he returned to the Navy Office of Information as the executive assistant to the Chief of Information. In July 1989, Pietropaoli returned to the waterfront as the public affairs officer for the Commander of the Second Fleet aboard the flagship, USS MOUNT WHITNEY, followed by a tour as media relations officer for the commander of the Atlantic Fleet and the U.S. Atlantic Command.

Pietropaoli returned to Washington as head of the Navy's national news desk in July 1992 and became assistant chief of information for media operations in April 1994. Upon graduation from the National War College in June of 1997, where he was awarded the Master of Science in National Security Strategy, Pietropaoli reported for duty in the office of the Chairman, Joint Chiefs of Staff.

Rear Admiral Pietropaoli is married to the former Dawn McInerney of Drexel Hill, Pennsylvania. Their first son, Daniel, was born in October 1992, and Matthew joined the family in August 1995.

COLONEL TIMOTHY B. MACGREGOR

Colonel Tim MacGregor is Deputy Director of CAPSTONE, National Defense University, Fort Lesley J. McNair, Washington, D.C. CAPSTONE's mission is to ensure newly selected generals and flag officers understand the fundamentals of joint doctrine and the Joint Operational Art; how to integrate the elements of national power in order to accomplish national security and national military strategies; and how joint, interagency, and multinational operations support national strategic goals and objectives.

Colonel MacGregor enlisted in the Air Force in 1983, and in 1986 received an appointment to the USAF Academy where he graduated with military distinction in 1990. He earned his Air Force pilot's wings in 1991, later serving on five wing staffs, including duties as Wing Executive Officer, Chief of Public Affairs, and Chief of Protocol. His flying assignments have included: KC-135R Aircraft Commander, T-1A Instructor Pilot, and KC-10A Evaluator Pilot, Chief of Standardization/Evaluation, Director of Operations and Squadron Commander. During his Headquarters Air Force tour in AF/A8's Directorate of Programs at the Pentagon, Colonel MacGregor served as Chief of the Global Mobility Division's (A8PM) Air Refueling, then Intratheater Airlift Branches. He also served as Senior Air Force Analyst while detailed by the Office of the Secretary of Defense to the staff of the 2005 Defense Base Realignment and Closure Commission (BRAC).



Colonel MacGregor is a command pilot with approximately 3,600 flying hours in the KC-135R, T-1A, and KC-10A, including 56 combat missions over Iraq and Afghanistan during Operations IRAQI FREEDOM and ENDURING FREEDOM. In 2003, he commanded the first KC-10 combat mission of IRAQI FREEDOM, later serving as Operations Officer (2003) and Commander (2008) of the deployed KC-10 squadron flying Southwest Asia combat missions.

MAJOR(Dr) GLENN BURNS

Major Glenn Burns is the Flight Commander of the Emergency Services Flight, 88th Medical Group, Wright-Patterson AFB, OH. He leads 111 personnel in the largest emergency services flight/integrated emergency medicine residency in the US Air Force and directs a \$2.3M workload annually for >30K patients and ambulance responses per year. He is also one of two Associate Professors of emergency medicine in the US Air Force and holds academic appointments at four different universities, including honorary international faculty at the Israeli Defense Force Medical School in Jerusalem Israel. He is actively engaged internationally with key US partners in military medical education and the development of training programs for point-of-injury care, medical disaster leadership and child/family reintegration in disaster response. He has been an invited speaker on these topics at conferences in Tel Aviv Israel, Toulon France, Singapore, Washington DC, San Antonio TX and Philadelphia PA and has chaired national committees on graduate medical education as well as disaster response and planning. He has published on medical leadership education, blast injury, tactical combat casualty care, mass casualty response and point-of-injury care and currently holds a Special Experience Identifier as an Air Force Global Health Specialist and is an international instructor with the Defense Institute for Medical Operations in to topics of Leadership in Regional Disaster Response, Mass Casualty Response and Critical Care.



Major Burns enlisted in the United States Marine Corps in 1987, served in OPERATION DESERT SHIELD/STORM and earned his Bachelor's of Science Degree summa cum laude in Anthropology in 1996. He matriculated at the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences in Bethesda MD and received his Doctor of Medicine Degree in 2002. He then completed his emergency medicine residency at the integrated emergency medicine residency program at Wright-State University where he was selected to serve as the Chief Resident from 2004 to 2005. Following residency he was assigned to Andrews AFB, MD from 2005 to 2007, where he was primarily tasked to special operations and deployed in support of various Joint Task Forces engaged in combat operations in OPERATION IRAQI FREEDOM. In 2007 he was assigned as billeted faculty to the Department of Military and Emergency Medicine at the Uniformed Services University of the Health Sciences (USUHS) where he was responsible for directing the operational medicine curriculum for junior military medical students as well as developing/implementing a new core leadership curriculum.

Major Burns has also deployed in support of numerous humanitarian assistance/disaster response operations as well as medical readiness exercises throughout the world and has partnered with several universities to support development of international medical programs for new physicians. Additionally, he is currently assigned to a Tactical Critical Care Evacuation Team (TCCET) for deployment to the AOR; the TCCET is the Air Force's newest medical asset designed to bring the highest level of medical care directly to the casualty on the battlefield, specifically at the point of injury, in order to initiate Level-1 trauma resuscitation while our wounded are still on the battlefield.

Brigadier General Brian D. Beaudreault

Deputy Commander, U.S Marine Corps Forces Central Command

Brigadier General Beaudreault graduated from the University of Massachusetts and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in May 1983. After completing The Basic School with honors and the Infantry Officers Course, he reported to 1st Battalion, 3rd Marines at Kaneohe Bay, HI. From 1984-1987 he served as a platoon commander and company executive officer and executed two unit deployments to Okinawa.



From 1987-1990 he served as the guard officer at Marine Corps Security Force Company Roosevelt Roads, Puerto Rico. He attended the Amphibious Warfare School at Quantico, VA in 1990 and graduated with honors. In 1991 he was assigned to 2nd Battalion, 9th Marines where he served as the assistant operations officer, battalion logistics officer, and was the maritime special purpose force commander and a rifle company commander with the 15th Marine Expeditionary Unit during Operation RESTORE HOPE in Somalia. From 1993 to 1995 he was assigned as the Inspector-Instructor for K Company, 3rd Battalion, 23rd Marines in Memphis, TN.

In 1995 he attended the Army Command and General Staff College and was subsequently assigned as the Ground Plans Officer, Operations Directorate, U.S. Central Command from 1996-1999. During his CENTCOM tour he attended the Joint Forces Staff College and was designated a joint qualified officer.

From 1999-2001 he was assigned as the operations officer for the 31st Marine Expeditionary Unit and deployed to East Timor in support of Operation STABILISE. During June 2001, he transferred to Camp Pendleton, CA and assumed the duties as executive officer for the 1st Marine Regiment. He commanded 1st Battalion, 1st Marines from April 2002 to April 2004. Battalion Landing Team 1/1 deployed as the ground combat element of the 13th Marine Expeditionary Unit and conducted operations on the Al Faw peninsula in support of Multinational Division-Southeast, Iraq.

In 2005 he graduated from the Naval War College with Highest Distinction and received an M.A. in National Security and Strategic Studies. He assumed command of the 15th MEU in August 2005. The 15th MEU deployed with the Boxer Strike Group from September 2006-May 2007 and operated under Multinational Forces-West in Anbar Province, Iraq. The 15th MEU also deployed with the Peleliu Strike Group to the Central Command region from May-November 2008 where they served as the theater reserve force. He relinquished command during December 2008. From January-April 2009, Brigadier General Beaudreault attended the United Kingdom's Higher Command and Staff Course and the Defense Strategic Leadership Program at the UK Defense Academy in Shrivenham, England. During June 2009 he transferred to Quantico, VA and served as the Director of the Expeditionary Warfare School.

During July 2010, he assumed his current duties as the Deputy Commander for Marine Forces Central Command.

BGen Coffman's awards include the Legion of Merit, two Bronze Stars for service in OIF, the Purple Heart for wounds received while flying a Casualty Evacuation mission in Iraq in 2004, multiple single mission and strike flight Air Medals, other personal decorations for meritorious service, and numerous campaign and service medals.

BGen Coffman is currently assigned to the Operations Directorate of the Joint Staff at the Pentagon, where he serves as a Deputy Director of Operations for the National Military Command Center.

Edward E. Young is the Executive Director, Operations, U.S. Customs and Border Protection, Office of Air and Marine. The Office of Air and Marine is the world's largest aviation and maritime law enforcement organization with more than 1,200 Federal agents, operating from 80 air and marine locations, with 269 aircraft of 26 different types and 297 maritime vessels. As the Executive Director, Operations, he provides operational oversight over all aviation and maritime missions, both foreign and domestic.

Executive Director Young has over 20 years of law enforcement experience. He began his employment with the legacy U.S. Customs Service in September 1990 as an Air Interdiction Officer in Albuquerque, New Mexico. During his tenure in Albuquerque he was assigned to several local and Federal taskforces, warrant entry teams and served as an instructor in aviation tactics and interdiction operations. In March 1997, he was promoted to an Enforcement Aviation Specialist assigned to the Customs National Aviation Center in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma where he served as the Program Manager for Foreign Operations involving U.S. Customs aviation personnel and assets. In May 2000, Executive Director Young was selected as an Enforcement Aviation Operations Officer, within the Air and Marine Interdiction Division in Washington, DC. In this role, he directed and advised field-level managers on planning and policy matters pertaining to Customs Air and Marine counter-drug and counterterrorism interdiction operations.

On March 1, 2003, the Department of Homeland Security established its investigative arm, the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE). In April 2003 Executive Director Young was assigned to the ICE Assistant Secretary's staff as the Air and Marine Advisor. The following November he was promoted to Supervisory Special Agent and undertook a diversified role within the agency, coordinating integration and transformation projects for all elements of the newly-created agency.
