Major General Gregg F. Martin, United States Army

President, National Defense University

Major General Gregg F. Martin is the 14th President of National Defense University, the pre-eminent national and international security educational institution. Prior to arriving at Fort McNair, MG Martin served as the 48th Commandant of the United States Army War College.

Born in Massachusetts, MG Martin was a walk-on to Army ROTC at the University of Maine and subsequently graduated from the U.S. Military Academy with a bachelor's degree; commissioned in 1979 into the Army Corps of Engineers. He later earned master's degrees in civil engineering and technology policy, as well as a Ph.D. in engineering management and public policy from MIT, with a dissertation on strategic leadership and organizational change. He is a graduate of the Army Command and General Staff College as well as the Joint Forces Staff College. He also graduated from the Naval and Army War Colleges, and holds master's degrees in strategic studies from both.



Critical command and troop leadership positions include: Deputy Commanding General of Third Army and US Army Central, forward deployed in Kuwait, during the simultaneous buildup in Afghanistan and drawdown from Iraq. Before that, he served as Commanding General of the U.S. Army Maneuver Support Center of Excellence and Fort Leonard Wood, MO; Commandant of the US Army Engineer School and Regiment and Deputy Commanding General of the US Army Maneuver Support Center; Commanding General and Division Engineer of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers Northwestern Division in Portland, OR (during which time he was also a Presidential appointee, confirmed by the Senate, to the Mississippi River Commission); and command of the 130th Engineer Brigade and service as the V Corps/CJTF-7 Engineer in Europe and the Middle East from June 2002 to July 2004, which included the ground assault to Baghdad, liberation of Iraq, and leading an expanded brigade of 13,000 soldiers conducting full-spectrum operations across Iraq in the first year of Operation Iraqi Freedom. Other commands include the 5th Engineer Battalion at Fort Leonard Wood, MO (providing direct support to the 3rd Armored Cavalry Regiment), and B Company, 79th Engineer Battalion in Karlsruhe, Germany. As a lieutenant, he was a Platoon Leader and Company Executive Officer with the 94th Engineer Battalion in Darmstadt, Germany.

MG Martin's staff positions include: Assistant Deputy Chief of Staff (Operations and Plans) for U.S. Army Europe and 7th Army in Heidelberg, Germany; Task Force Engineer with Joint Task Force Bravo in Honduras and Central America; I Corps Engineer Operations Officer; Operations Officer and Executive Officer of the 864th Engineer Battalion at Fort Lewis, WA; and Project Engineer in the Corps of Engineers' Europe Division in Karlsruhe, Germany.

MG Martin's leader development and education positions include: Instructor and Director of Senior Command and Leadership at the Army War College; Instructor and Assistant Professor of National Security Studies, International Relations and American Politics in the Department of Social Sciences, as well as Recruiting and Admissions Officer at the US Military Academy at West Point, NY.

MG Martin's awards and decorations include the Army Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit (3 Awards), the Bronze Star Medal, the Meritorious Service Medal (8 Awards), the Joint Service Commendation Medal, the Army Commendation Medal (2 Awards), the Army Achievement Medal, Parachutist Badge, Ranger Tab, and Combat Action Badge. He was chosen by *Engineering News Record* for the 2003 "Award of Excellence" as the engineering profession's Person of the Year for his leadership role in Operation Iraqi Freedom, a testament to our magnificent Soldiers.

Ambassador Nancy McEldowney

Interim President & Senior Vice President, National Defense University

Ambassador Nancy McEldowney assumed the duties of Interim NDU President upon the retirement of Vice Admiral Ann E. Rondeau on April 11, 2012. Major General Gregg Martin, currently the Commandant of the Army War College in Carlisle, Pennsylvania, is expected to assume the duties of NDU President during the summer of 2012.



Ambassador McEldowney became the Senior Vice President of the NDU on August 1, 2011. In this capacity, she coordinates the University's international programs and outreach. Prior to this, she served as Principal Deputy Assistant Secretary in the Bureau of European and Eurasian Affairs, with oversight responsibility for 49 countries in Europe and Eurasia, as well as the NATO alliance, the European Union, and the Organization for Security Cooperation in Europe (OSCE). Previously, she served as the U.S. Ambassador to the Republic of Bulgaria, as well as Deputy Chief of Mission in Ankara, Turkey and Baku, Azerbaijan. During the Clinton Administration, Ambassador McEldowney served at the White House as Director of European Affairs on the National Security Council staff.

Ambassador McEldowney has also served overseas at the U.S. Embassies in Cairo, Egypt and Bonn, Germany. In addition, she was a member of the U.S. Delegation to the Strategic Arms Reduction Talks with the Soviet Union in Geneva, Switzerland.

Within the Department of State, Ambassador McEldowney has worked in the Office of Soviet Affairs, the Office of European Security Affairs, and the Office of the Deputy Secretary. She has also served in the Office of the Secretary of Defense at the Pentagon.

Ambassador McEldowney has been granted the State Department's Superior Honor Award on five occasions, and is also a recipient of the Sinclair Linguistic Award.

Ambassador McEldowney is a member of the Senior Foreign Service. She completed her undergraduate studies at New College and holds graduate degrees from Columbia University and the National Defense University. A native of Florida, Ambassador McEldowney is married and has two daughters

**ASHY, JOSEPH W., GENERAL,
U.S. AIR FORCE (RETIRED)**



General Joe Ashy graduated from Texas A&M University with a degree in mechanical engineering. After commissioning, he attended flying school at Reese AFB, Texas, and gunnery school at Luke AFB, Arizona. His first assignment was to the 494th Tactical Fighter Squadron at RAF Lakenheath, England. He flew 289 combat missions in Southeast Asia with the 3rd Tactical Wing. Other aircraft he has flown operationally include the A-7, F-4, F-5 and F-16. He served in various staff positions: at HQ USAF as a division chief in the deputate of plans and operations; as executive officer to the

Air Force Chief of Staff; and, at Tactical Air command (TAC) Headquarters as IG, chief of staff, director of plans, director of operations, and later as the vice commander. He was the operations officer of an F-4 squadron in Korea, commanded an F-4 fighter squadron, two fighter wings (the 37th Tactical Fighter Wing "Wild Weasels" and the 57th Fighter Weapons Wing at Nellis AFB), the USAF Fighter Weapons Center, 16th Air Force, two Air Force major commands (Air Training Command and Air Force Space Command), a theater component command (NATO's AIRSOUTH), and two combined/joint commands (NORAD and U.S. Space Command). Before assuming command of the latter, he commanded NATO air forces in the Mediterranean theater and directed the combat air operations over the Balkans/Bosnia. Before his retirement in October 1996, he was "triple hatted" as CINCNORAD, CINCUSSPACECOM and COMAFSPC. He is a command pilot with over 3500 hours in fighter and attack aircraft. Decorations include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal with oak leaf cluster, the Silver Star and the Distinguished Flying Cross with oak leaf cluster.

Currently, he is President of Ashy & Associates, L.L.C. and is a consultant for several aerospace firms. Besides being a senior fellow for CAPSTONE, he serves in the Independent Strategic Assessment Group (ISAG) process for the commanders of NORTHCOM/NORAD and Air Force Space Command. He also participates in other ongoing analyses projects including reviews of missile defense, space launch, global positioning services, and joint command and control integration.



CARNS, MICHAEL P.C., GENERAL

U.S. AIR FORCE (RETIRED)

General Carns graduated from the U.S. Air Force Academy in 1959 as a member of its first class with a Bachelor of Science degree. Following pilot training, General Carns served as a Flight Instructor at Laredo AFB, Texas. In 1961, he was appointed Aide to the Commander, Air Reserve Records Center, Denver, Colorado, then Aide to the Commander, 4th Air Force Reserve Region, Randolph AFB, Texas, followed by duty as Air Operations Officer at the same base. Following graduation from Harvard

University in 1967, with a masters degree in Business Administration, he was then assigned to the 476th Tactical Fighter Squadron, George AFB, California, then the 40th Tactical Fighter Squadron, Eglin AFB, Florida. In August 1968, he was assigned to the 469th Tactical Fighter Squadron, Korat Royal Thai AFB, Thailand, where he flew 200 combat missions in the F-4E. In 1969, he was assigned to Air Force headquarters as a Plans and Programs Officer, and later, as Aide to the Air Force Chief of Staff. This was followed by tours at Torrejon AB, Spain; SHAPE Headquarters, Belgium; and, RAF Bentwaters, England. Subsequent assignments included: command of the 354th Tactical Fighter Wing, Myrtle Beach AFBSC; command of the 57th Fighter Weapons Wing, Nellis AFB, NV; Director of Operations, J-3, Rapid Deployment Joint Task Force, later redesignated U.S. Central Command; and Deputy Chief of Staff for Plans and, later, Deputy Chief of Staff for Operations and Intelligence, HQ Pacific Air Forces, Hickam AFB, HI. In 1986, he took command of 13th Air Force, Clark Air Base, Philippines, and was assigned in 1987 as Deputy in Chief and Chief of Staff, U.S. Pacific Command, Camp H.M. Smith, HI. In 1989, he became Director of the Joint Staff, Washington, DC. In 1991, he became Vice Chief of Staff of the Air Force, the position he held until retirement in 1994.

After retirement, General Carns served as the Managing Director of a small healthcare firm for one year (94-95), followed by over four years (until Feb 00) as Executive Director of a New York-based policy research firm specializing in Pacific Rim security, international capital flows and international energy demands. Currently, General Carns serves on a number of DoD panels, boards and task forces, boards of directors of corporations, and consults for a number of businesses.

General Carns is a member of the Board of Directors of: Rockwell Collins, Inc, Cedar Rapids, IA; Mykrolis Corporation, Billerica, MA; WebGen Systems, Boston, MA; Engineered Support Systems Inc, St Louis, MO., and Precision Remotes Inc,

Richmond, CA. He holds appointments as: member, U S Comptroller General (GAO) Board of Advisors; Member, Department of Defense Science Board; Member, Board of Advisors, National Security Agency (NSA); Senior Fellow, National Defense University (NDU), Department of Defense; Member, National Geospatial Agency (NGA) Forum; Member, Threat Reduction Advisory Council, Defense Threat Reduction Agency (DTRA); Member, Board of Visitors, Air University; Chairman, Board of Visitors, Air Force Institute of Technology; Member, Defense Science Study Group, Institute for Defense Analysis; member, Board of Trustees, Monterey Institute of International Studies; and, member, Board of Trustees, Falcon Foundation, an educational foundation.

In his various capacities, General Carns maintains extensive international contacts with senior level government, university academic and business officials. In the past year, he has had several on-site dialogues with governmental and business leaders in China, Japan, Republic of Korea, United Kingdom, France, Belgium, Bahrain, Kuwait, Egypt, Mongolia, Afghanistan, Iraq, Australia and India, with additional visits planned to Europe, the Pacific and the Middle East/Gulf in 2004.


General Carns has authored and published a number of articles on current issues, including such topics as the need to substantially alter the military acquisition process, the benefits of privatizing military logistics functions, the lagging role of the United States in space, the role of the military warfighter, the eroding effectiveness of US nuclear deterrence; the evolving role of military force, the evolving nature of deterrence, and most recently applying energy efficiency standards to weapons system effectiveness.

GENERAL KEVIN P. CHILTON**Retired Feb. 1, 2011.**

Gen. Kevin P. Chilton retired as the Commander, U.S. Strategic Command, Offutt Air Force Base, Neb. He was responsible for the plans and operations for all U.S. forces conducting strategic deterrence and Department of Defense space and cyberspace operations.

General Chilton is a distinguished graduate of the U.S. Air Force Academy and a Columbia University Guggenheim Fellow. A distinguished graduate from the U.S. Air Force pilot training and test pilot Schools, he flew operational assignments in the RF-4C and F-15 and weapons testing in the F-4 and F-15. The general also served 11 years at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and commanded STS-76, his third space shuttle mission.

The general has commanded at the wing, numbered air force, major command and unified combatant command levels.



Gen Chilton currently serves as a Capstone Senior Fellow at the National Defense University (NDU) and as a mentor for the Defense Science Study Group at the Institute for Defense Analysis (IDA). He is a Director for the Anadarko Petroleum Corporation, HDT Global, and the Orbital Sciences Corporation and a Trustee for the Aerospace Corporation. Additionally, he supports the Air Force Academy on the Boards of the Falcon Foundation and Association of Graduates.

**Neal, Richard S., General,
U. S. Marine Corps
(Retired)**



General Neal graduated from Northeastern University, Boston, Massachusetts in 1965, with a Bachelors of Science Degree in History and Education. He earned a Masters of Arts Degree from Tulane University, New Orleans, Louisiana in 1973. Following the completion of the Basic School, Quantico and subsequently the Field Artillery Officer Basic Course at Fort Sill, Oklahoma, General Neal was assigned to the 3rd Marine Division, Republic of Vietnam, where he served as a Forward Observer with the 3d Battalion, 9th Marines. He returned to Vietnam in January 1970, where he was assigned as an Infantry Battalion Advisor to the Vietnamese Marine Corps. Upon his return from overseas, he attended Amphibious Warfare School. In 1973, he served as the Commanding Officer of the 2d 155 Howitzer Battery, 2d Field Artillery Group at Camp Lejeune, North Carolina. Following a tour as head of the Company Grade Assignment Section at Headquarters Marine Corps, he attended the Marine Corps Command and Staff College. He served on the Air-Ground Exchange Program as S-3, Marine Aircraft Group 36, on Okinawa. He was later assigned as the Head, Operations Division, Amphibious Warfare School, Quantico. In 1982, he was selected to attend the National War College in Washington, D.C. Upon completion of school, he returned to Camp Lejuene to command the 5th Battalion, 10th Marines. He was promoted to colonel in 1985 and was assigned to the U.S. Central Command, MacDill AFB, Florida, as the Chief of Policy/Strategy Division and later as the Chief of the Special Projects Division in the J-5 Directorate. In July 1990, General Neal was promoted to Brigadier General and assigned as the Director, Manpower Plans and Policy Division, Manpower and Reserve Affairs Department. He served as the Deputy for Operations at U.S. Central Command for Operations DESERT SHIELD/DESERT STORM from September 1990 to April 1991. From June 1992 to August 1992, he served as Commanding General, Joint Task Force for Operation GITMO, a humanitarian relief effort for Haitian migrants at Guantanamo Naval Base, Cuba. In April 1993, he served as the Commanding General of the 2d Marine Division and as the Deputy Commander in Chief/Chief of Staff, U.S. Central Command in October 1994. General Neal was promoted to General 9 September 1996 and was later assigned as the Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps. He held this post until his retirement on 1 Nov 98.

William L. Nyland, General, USMC (Ret)



General William L. "Spider" Nyland served as the Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps, Headquarters Marine Corps, Washington D.C. from September 2002 until September 2005. He retired from active duty 1 November 2005.

Gen. Nyland was commissioned a second lieutenant in the Marine Corps under the NROTC program upon graduation from the University of New Mexico in 1968. In addition to attaining an M.S. degree from the University of Southern California, his formal military education includes The Basic School (1968), Naval Aviation Flight Training (NFO) (1969), Amphibious Warfare School (1975), Navy Fighter Weapons School (TopGun) (1977), College of Naval Command and Staff, Naval War College (1981), and Air War College (1988).

After being assigned to VMFA-531, General Nyland was ordered to Vietnam where he flew 122 combat missions with VMFA-314 and VMFA-115. General Nyland's other tours included Instructor RIO, VMFAT-101; Squadron Assistant Operations Officer and Operations Officer, VMFA-115; and Brigade FORSTAT and Electronic Warfare Officer, 1st Marine Brigade. He also served as Operations Officer and Director of Safety and Standardization, VMFA-212; Aviation Safety Officer and Congressional Liaison/Budget Officer, Headquarters, U.S. Marine Corps, Washington, D.C.; and Operations Officer, Marine Aircraft Group-24, 1st Marine Amphibious Brigade. He commanded VMFA-232, the Marine Corps' oldest and most decorated fighter squadron, from July 1985 to July 1987.

General Nyland subsequently served as section chief for the Central Command section, European Command/Central Command Branch, Joint Operations Division, Directorate of Operations (J-3), Joint Staff, Washington, D.C. In July 1990, he assumed command of Marine Aviation Training Support Group, Pensacola. Following his command of MATSG he assumed duties as Chief of Staff, 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing on July 5, 1992, and assumed additional duties as Assistant Wing Commander on November 10, 1992. He was promoted to Brigadier General on September 1, 1994 and was assigned as Assistant Wing Commander, 2nd MAW serving in that billet until December 1, 1995.

He served next on the Joint Staff, J-8, as the Deputy Director for Force Structure and Resources, completing that tour on June 30, 1997. He was advanced to Major General on July 2, 1997, and assumed duties as the Deputy Commanding General, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C. He served next as the Commanding General, 2d Marine Aircraft Wing, MCAS Cherry Point, North Carolina from July 1998 to June 2000. He was advanced to Lieutenant General on 30 June 2000 and assumed duties as the Deputy Commandant for Programs and Resources, Headquarters, U.S. Marine Corps. He next assumed duties as the Deputy Commandant for Aviation on 3 August 2001. He was advanced to General on 4 September 2002 and assumed his duties as the Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps on 10 September 2002.

His personal decorations include: Defense Distinguished Service Medal, Distinguished Service Medal, Legion of Merit, Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, the Air Medal with eight Strike/Flight awards, and Joint Service Commendation Medal.

Stephen R. Pietropaoli **Senior Director, CAPSTONE**



Stephen Pietropaoli reported to the National Defense University in November of 2009 to become Director of the CAPSTONE, KEYSTONE, and PINNACLE programs, which were created to prepare senior military and civilian leadership to better deal with the challenges of working in a joint environment. In an increasingly interconnected world, joint operations are required to meet rapidly evolving national security needs. These programs examine major issues affecting national security decision-making, Inter-agency issues, military strategy, joint/combined doctrine, interoperability, and the international implications of national policy.

Prior to reporting to NDU, Pietropaoli was the Executive Director of the Navy League of the United States, a position he assumed in October of 2003, coincident with retirement after 26 years of naval service. Founded in 1902 with the support of President Theodore Roosevelt, the Navy League is a powerful voice for a strong maritime component to our national defense. The Navy League's missions include keeping the public and elected officials informed about the importance of seapower to national security and economic prosperity and providing direct support to sea service personnel and their families through our 250 Councils worldwide.

As the Navy's Chief of Information from August 2000 until July 2003, Pietropaoli was responsible for all aspects of the Navy's public affairs program, and was the principal public affairs counselor to the Secretary of the Navy and the Chief of Naval Operations. Prior to his promotion to flag rank, Pietropaoli was the special assistant for public affairs to Army Generals Hugh Shelton and John Shalikashvili during their tenures as Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

A 1977 graduate of Cornell University, Pietropaoli began his career aboard surface combatants in the Atlantic Fleet, serving as electrical officer aboard the destroyer USS HAWKINS and as anti-submarine warfare officer aboard the frigate USS BOWEN, completing two deployments to the Mediterranean and one circumnavigation of South America as part of the UNITAS exercises with South American navies.

Following his initial sea tour, Pietropaoli reported to the Naval Reserve Officer Training Corps at the University of Pennsylvania as engineering instructor and freshman advisor. While there, Pietropaoli was selected for re-designation as a public affairs specialist, one of only 200 such officers in the Navy. Reporting to the Office of Information, he spent the next three years on the Navy's national news desk in the Pentagon, working daily with the Pentagon press corps and media from around the world.

After completing a master's degree in Broadcast Journalism at American University, he returned to the Navy Office of Information as the executive assistant to the Chief of Information. Dyer Marine Medium Helicopter Squadron of the Year for 2004.



Then Colonel Coffman commanded the 13th Marine Expeditionary Unit (13th MEU) at Camp Pendleton from January 2008 to October 2011. He led the "fighting thirteenth" through two full deployment cycles, culminating in seven month deployments aboard BOXER Amphibious Ready Group (BOX ARG) in 2009 and again in 2011. During these deployments, the BOX ARG/13th MEU team supported operations, exercises, and training across PACOM, CENTCOM, and AFRICOM AORs. 2009 deployment highlights included extended counter-piracy operations in the Gulf of Aden and Somali Basin. The 2011 deployment featured extended national tasking in support of counter-terrorism operations, and CENTCOM Contingency Response activities during the turmoil of the "Arab Spring."

BGen Coffman has served on staff at multiple levels of command, including MEU, MAG, MEF, JTF, and Combatant Command. At USCENTCOM from 1999 to 2002, he supported the development and execution of combined exercise programs with friendly nations on the Arabian Peninsula and supervised the USCENTCOM ARG-MEU Exercise Program. In 2003, he participated in Operation Iraqi Freedom I as MAG-16 Operations Officer. From 2006 to 2008 he served as Future Operations Officer for I MEF.

BGen Coffman graduated with honors from both The Basic School and the Amphibious Warfare School, earned a Master of Arts in National Security and Strategic Studies with highest distinction while attending the College of Naval Command and Staff at the Naval War College in Newport, Rhode Island, and completed a Top-Level-School-equivalent fellowship with the Rand Corporation in Santa Monica, California where he served as Commandant of the Marine Corps Fellow providing Marine expertise to the ongoing national defense related research conducted at Rand.

BGen Coffman's awards include the Legion of Merit, two Bronze Stars for service in OIF, the Purple Heart for wounds received while flying a Casualty Evacuation mission in Iraq in 2004, multiple single mission and strike flight Air Medals, other personal decorations for meritorious service, and numerous campaign and service medals.

BGen Coffman is currently assigned to the Operations Directorate of the Joint Staff at the Pentagon, where he serves as a Deputy Director of Operations for the National Military Command Center.

Prior to his current assignment, General Cotton served as the Commander, 341st Missile Wing, Malmstrom Air Force Base, Mont., responsible for the operation, maintenance and security of the intercontinental ballistic missile force in central Montana. Maura K. Dollymore was promoted to the rank of Rear Admiral (upper half) in November 2011 and concurrently named as an Assistant US Surgeon General. Rear Admiral Dollymore is the Coast Guard's Surgeon General and Chief Safety Officer, serving as the Director of Health, Safety and Work-Life.

She is responsible for the Coast Guard's health care system of 42 clinics and 150 sick bays, as well as, operational and off-duty mishap prevention, response and investigation. She oversees the Coast Guard's child care programs and food services delivery programs, ashore and afloat, and the Coast Guard's Ombudsman, Substance Abuse, Health Promotion and Sexual Assault Prevention and Response programs.

RADM Dollymore is board certified in Internal Medicine. She received her Doctorate of Medicine degree from the University of Maryland in 1981. Her Internal Medicine training was done at the University of Maryland and the Loch Raven VA Hospital and completed in 1984.

RADM Dollymore entered the Commissioned Corps of the United States Public Health Service (USPHS) in 1984 as a National Health Service Corps Scholar. She served for three years in McDowell County in Southern West Virginia helping to open a rural hospital in an isolated mining community, where she provided primary care to include obstetrics.

After completing her assignment in 1987, Dr. Dollymore became the medical director of the Shenandoah Community Health Center in the Eastern Panhandle of West VA. Her eight years of medical practice was dedicated to direct patient care to underserved populations. As the local hospital's Dept. of Medicine Chair and President of the Medical Staff, she was responsible for program development and services to the local community.

In addition, she volunteered for two short tours with the PHS as a reservist in 1989 with the Indian Health Service and in 1992 at the USCG clinic in Kodiak, Alaska.

In 1995 Dr. Dollymore returned to active duty with the PHS and USCG as a medical officer and then the Chief of Health Services at the USCG Training Center, Cape May.

In 2002 she was reassigned to serve as Chief, Health Services at the Coast Guard Academy.

In 2005 RADM Dollymore assumed the duties as Chief, Health and Safety, Maintenance and Logistics Command, Atlantic. She was a key partner in the modernization of health, safety and work-life services and the stand-up of the Health Safety and Work-life Support Activity.

RADM Dollymore served as the senior clinician in the field, Health Safety and Work-life Support Activity, Chief of the Clinical staff from 2008 until 2009. She served as Chief, Office of Health and Safety (CG-112) from 2009 until November 2011.

Rear Admiral Dollymore is a three time recipient of the Coast Guard Meritorious Service Medal.

Brig. Gen. David A. Harris is Commander, 96th Test Wing, Air Force Materiel Command, Eglin Air Force Base, Fla--the largest wing in the Air Force. He leads more than 9,600 military, civilian, and contractor personnel, in accomplishing the Test Wing's missions of developmental testing and evaluation of conventional munitions, command and control systems, aircraft avionics and guidance systems, and radar cross section measurement. He is also responsible for providing all base operating support, infrastructure, and services support for the Department of Defense's largest installation (724 sq miles). He commands seven groups and 40 squadrons. The Test Wing operates 26 modified test aircraft; manages 185,500 square miles of over-water test ranges, plus facilities in six different states. As commander, he interacts with local officials across a three-county, 11-city region with a military economic impact of \$1.8 billion annually.

He has held various assignments in flying units including instructor and evaluator electronic warfare officer in the EF-111A, and experimental flight test weapon systems officer in the B-1B. He has served as director of the Global Power Bomber Combined Test Force and commanded the 419th Flight Test Squadron at Edwards AFB, Calif. Mr. James J. Kren was appointed as Deputy Director of the Defense Security Service (DSS) on September 11, 2011. He is a member of the Defense Intelligence Senior Executive Service.



The DSS mission is to support national security and the warfighter by securing the nation's technological base, and overseeing the protection of U.S. and foreign classified information in the hands of industry. DSS accomplishes this mission by: Clearing industrial facilities, personnel and associated information systems; collecting, analyzing and providing threat information to industry and government partners; managing foreign ownership, control and influence in cleared industry; providing advice and oversight to industry; delivering security education and training; and, providing information technology services that support the industrial security mission of DoD and its partner agencies.

As Deputy Director, Mr. Kren serves as the principal advisor and consultant to the Director of DSS. He formulates policy, manages agency resources, and leads operational activities to accomplish DSS's mission. Mr. Kren is responsible for the Agency's innovation efforts, ensuring future program viability and continuity.

Prior to his assignment to DSS, Mr. Kren served as the Director of Innovation and Collaboration, Intelligence Systems Support Office (ISSO), Office of the Secretary of the Air Force. The ISSO supports the initiatives and activities of the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense for Intelligence. During his tenure with ISSO, he was assigned to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) in Brussels, Belgium, first as special advisor to the Assistant Secretary General for Defense Investment from 2006-2008 and then as General Manager of the Battlefield Information Collection and Exploitation Systems (BICES) Agency from 2008-2011. In that capacity, he directed the agency's mission of enabling and enhancing multinational intelligence sharing and exchange.



In 1987, Mr. Kren began his career with the Defense Mapping Agency (DMA), later the National Imagery and Mapping Agency (NIMA). During his 13 years with DMA/NIMA, Mr. Kren held a variety of positions with increasing responsibility, to include systems engineer, physical scientist, cartographer and geographer. As a staff officer for the Systems and Technology Directorate, he supported the Tasking, Processing, Exploitation and Dissemination Assessment Process where he led the U.S. Imagery and Geospatial Information Service Operational Requirements Document development for NIMA. Later, he served as a staff officer and NIMA liaison to the Deputy Assistant Secretary of Defense for Command, Control, Communications, Intelligence, Surveillance, Reconnaissance and Space.

He was the Deputy Director for the Cross Program Evaluation Directorate, Office of the Assistant Secretary of Defense for Command, Control, Communications, Intelligence, supporting the assessment and evaluation of net-centric programs of the Defense Department and the Intelligence Community. Brigadier General Sanborn was commissioned in May 1986 after graduating from the University of Florida on a NROTC scholarship. Upon completion of The Basic School, he reported to NAS Pensacola, FL for primary flight instruction and earned his wings in October 1988 at NAS Meridian, MS.

Brigadier General Sanborn reported to MCAS Cherry Point, NC for AV-8B transition training in November 1988. His initial assignment was to VMA-231, where he served in both operational and maintenance billets. In April 2003 Executive Director Young was assigned to the ICE Assistant Secretary's staff as the Air and Marine Advisor. The following November he was promoted to Supervisory Special Agent and undertook a diversified role within the agency, coordinating integration and transformation projects for all elements of the newly-created agency. He returned to the Office of Air and Marine in 2004 when he was selected as the Field Director, Albuquerque Air Branch. In 2006, he was relocated to Washington, DC, and promoted to Director for Coastal Operations and later assigned to the headquarters position of Deputy Director, Operations - Air, where he served until March 2011.

Executive Director Young received a Bachelors of Science degree in public administration and criminal justice from the University of Arizona in 1989. He attended the Federal Law Enforcement Training Center in 1990, and participated in the Customs Leadership Institute in 2002. In 2008, Director Young was selected for the Customs and Border Protection Senior Executive Service (SES) Candidate Development Program. He was awarded his Office of Personnel Management SES certification in 2010.
