

Brig. Gen. Robert S. Arthur is Vice Commander, 10th Air Force, Naval Air Station Joint Reserve Base Fort Worth, Texas. Tenth Air Force manages all fighter, bomber, special operations, rescue, airborne warning and control, flying training, combat air operations battle staff, unoccupied aerial vehicle and space units in the Air Force Reserve Command. These units are gained by the Air Combat Command, Air Force Special Operations Command, Pacific Air Forces, Air Force Space Command, and the Air Education and Training Command.

General Arthur received his commission through the Reserve Officer Training Corps program at Arizona State University where he earned a Bachelor of Science degree in business administration. He entered pilot training at Williams Air Force Base, Ariz., in 1978 and has since logged more than 4,000 hours as a command pilot. Prior to his current assignment, he was the Commander, 926th Fighter Wing, NAS JRB New Orleans, La.

Brigadier General Baczkowski currently serves as the Deputy Commander, U.S. Marine Corps Forces Central Command.

He graduated from the United States Naval Academy and was commissioned in May 1980. After completing The Basic School, Infantry Officer Course, and U.S. Army Ranger Course, he was assigned to 1st Battalion, 8th Marines where he served as a Rifle Platoon Commander and Company Executive Officer. During this assignment he deployed to Beirut, Lebanon from May to December 1983.



In 1984 he served at The Basic School as a tactics instructor and later served as an instructor at the Infantry Officers Course. Following this assignment, he attended the Amphibious Warfare School. Upon graduation, he was assigned to 3rd Battalion, 1st Marines where he served as Assistant Operations Officer. He assumed command of Kilo Company 3/1 in July 1990 and deployed to Operation DESERT STORM as part of 5th Marine Expeditionary Brigade.

In 1992 he was assigned to the Amphibious Warfare School as a tactics instructor and Ground Combat Occupational Field Enhancement Course coordinator. He graduated from the U.S. Marine Corps Command and Staff course in 1995 and was assigned to Marine Forces Pacific where he served as Ground Operations Officer, Operations Division.

In 1998 he was assigned to 1st Marine Division where he served as Current Operations Officer. In July 1999 he assumed command of 2nd Battalion, 4th Marines. During this assignment, the battalion deployed to Okinawa, became Battalion Landing Team 2/4 and served as the Ground Combat Element for the 31st Marine Expeditionary Unit (Special Operations Capable).

He attended the Industrial College of the Armed Forces and upon graduation in 2002 was assigned to the U.S. European Command where he served as Chief, Campaign Plans Division. He assumed command of the 4th Marine Regiment in July 2004 and deployed to Operation Iraqi Freedom II for duty as Senior Advisor to the First Division, New Iraqi Army. In November 2005 he was assigned as Director, Tactical Training and Exercise Control Group, Marine Corps Air Ground Task Force Training Command.

He holds a Bachelor of Science degree from the United States Naval Academy and Master of Science degrees from the University of Southern California, U.S. Marine Corps Command and Staff College, and the Industrial College of the Armed Forces. **Luther M. Beaty – Executive Director, Operations
U.S. Customs and Border Protection
Office of CBP Air and Marine**



Luther M. (Mark) Beaty has served as the Executive Director of Operations, Office of CBP Air and Marine since July 2007. In this key CBP Headquarters leadership position, Executive Director Beaty oversees the largest aviation and marine law enforcement agency in the world. His responsibilities include strategic planning, budget formulation and execution, development of acquisition plans, domestic and foreign aviation and maritime operations, and the oversight of over 1,500 personnel, 270 aircraft and 220 vessels. Additionally, Executive Director Beaty is designated as a Principal Federal Official within the Department of Homeland Security. Currently, he is the Federal Coordinator for the 2010 Winter Olympic Games. Executive Director Beaty completed Harvard University's Senior Manager's in Government in August, 2007.

Executive Director Beaty joined the United States Marine Corps in 1977 immediately after graduating from Miami University, OH. He served as a helicopter pilot in the Fleet Marine Force from 1979-1983 and with the Presidential Helicopter Squadron from 1983-1987. Upon completion of Defense Systems Management College, Executive Director Beaty was assigned as the program manager for infantry night vision and electro-optic systems from 1987-1990. After an inter-service transfer to the Air Force Reserve, Executive Director Beaty flew with the 71st Special Operations Squadron and the 305th Combat Rescue Squadron, Davis-Monthan Air Force Base, AZ, between 1991 and 2003. Executive Director Beaty was activated for his last year, and deployed to Ahmed Al Jaber Air Base, Kuwait as Director of Operations and Squadron Commander. He retired from the Air Force Reserve as a Lieutenant Colonel in 2003.

Executive Director Beaty began his Customs career in 1990 at the Tucson Aviation Branch. He has over 6,500 hours of flight experience in a variety of aircraft including the Blackhawk helicopter, Cessna Citation jet, AStar helicopter, and Cessna Centurion aircraft. He holds an Airline Transport Pilot rating in fixed- and rotary-wing aircraft. From 1999 to 2004, Executive Director Beaty served as Aviation Group Supervisor, Phoenix Aviation Unit. During this period, Beaty was the legacy U.S. Customs Service Airspace Security Coordinator for the 2002 Winter Olympics. From June 2004 to July 2007, Executive Director Beaty was the Director of Air Operations at the Bellingham, WA Air and Marine Branch, the first of five branches established along the United States northern border.

Brigadier General Beydler entered the United States Marine Corps in 1981 after graduating from the United States Naval Academy. Following graduation from The Basic School in April 1982, he commenced flight training and earned his wings in September 1983.

Completing F-4 Phantom transition training at MCAS Yuma, Arizona in the fall of 1984, he reported to MCAS Beaufort and joined the "Crusaders" of VMFA-122. Selected to remain with the squadron as it became the second MAG-31 squadron to transition to the F/A-18 aircraft, he was ordered to VFA-125 at NAS Lemoore, California in the summer of 1985 and completed F/A-18 transition training in December that year. While at MSTP, he was a Marine Expeditionary Force (MEF) staff planning instructor and participated in numerous MEF level Command Post Exercises. He was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant Colonel in April of 1998.

In July of 1999, Brigadier General Beydler reported to Commanding General, Third Marine Aircraft Wing for duty as the Deputy to the Assistant Chief of Staff G-5 Plans. He later served as the Assistant Chief of Staff G-5 Plans.

Brigadier General Beydler took command of Marine Fighter Attack Training Squadron 101 on 3 October 2000 and relinquished command of the squadron on 31 May 2002.

Brigadier General Beydler attended the NATO Defense College in Rome, Italy from August 2002 until February 2003. He then reported to the Headquarters, United States European Command (USEUCOM) in March of 2003 where he served as the Division Chief for the Joint Training, Readiness and Exercise Division within the USEUCOM Plans and Operations Center. Brigadier General Beydler was promoted to Colonel in August 2003.

Brigadier General Beydler reported to Headquarters 2d Marine Aircraft Wing in July 2005 and deployed to the United States Central Command Combined Air Operations Center in Al Udeid, Qatar as the Senior Marine Liaison Officer. He returned to Headquarters 2d Marine Aircraft Wing in February 2006.

Brigadier General Beydler assumed command of Marine Aircraft Group 31 on 25 May 2006 and relinquished command of the Group on 17 August 2007. He then reported to the Commander, United States Joint Forces Command on 6 September 2007 for duty as the Director, Standing Joint Force Headquarters.

Brigadier General Beydler accumulated well over 3500 flight hours in tactical jet aircraft with over 3000 in the F/A-18. His personal decorations include the Defense Superior Service Medal, the Legion of Merit, the Meritorious Service Medal with three Gold Stars, the Air Medal, the Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal, and the Navy and Marine Corps Achievement Medal with Gold Star.





Jack Edwards

Jack Edwards joined the U.S. Government Accountability Office (GAO) in its Washington, DC, office in 1998. He is an acting director in the Defense Capabilities and Management (DCM) group where he and his teams examine military personnel issues such as composition of the military, compensation and benefits, recruitment and retention, and security clearances,. Earlier, he served as an assistant director in GAO's Applied Research and Methods group where he provided methodological assistance to teams evaluating issues pertaining to national security, acquisition programs, and international affairs.

Before joining GAO, Jack was the chief of the Personnel Survey Branch at the Defense Manpower Data Center in Arlington, VA. In addition to serving as a survey advisor to the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense for Personnel and Readiness, he and his staff planned, designed, and conducted large-scale (e.g., 90,000-person) surveys for armed services personnel and wrote reports documenting findings. The surveys addressed issues such as racial/ethnic discrimination and harassment, financial services on military installations, and education quality in Department of Defense-run domestic elementary and secondary schools.

From 1989 to 1994, Jack was a personnel research psychologist at the Navy Personnel Research and Development Center in San Diego, CA. His assignments included science advisor to the Chief of Naval Personnel, acting division chief of the Women and Multicultural Research Office, and team leader for the officer-selection research program. He conducted or directed teams performing research in areas such as the selection of officer candidates to the U.S. Naval Academy and Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps, involvement in the Navy's disciplinary system, personnel surveys, and equal opportunity.

Earlier, Jack rose to the rank of tenured associate professor at the Illinois Institute of Technology (1981-1989) in Chicago, IL. His duties included teaching graduate- and undergraduate-level human resources and research methods classes, chairing dissertation and thesis committees, advising doctoral students, and maintaining an active research program. Also, Jack served as a consultant for organizations such as the U.S. Navy, United Airlines, Ameritech, and the Federal Reserve Bank in Chicago.

Jack has over 100 external publications and presentations—including four textbooks. His research has examined practical and theoretical concerns for a wide range of human resources and methodological issues, including program evaluation, personnel selection and evaluation, attitude measurement, leadership, diversity, survey methods, and utility analysis.

Jack earned a Ph.D. in 1981 from Ohio University, concentrating his studies on industrial and organizational psychology. He is a Fellow in both the American Psychological Association and the Society for Industrial and Organizational Psychology, and serves on the editorial board of the journal, *Personnel Psychology*. Since joining GAO, Jack has received GAO-wide honors that include Meritorious Service and Client Service awards, as well as DCM-wide honors such as the Leadership and Quality awards.

Brigadier General James M. Lariviere serves as the Director of Reserve Affairs Division, Headquarters Marine Corps.

Brigadier General Lariviere was born in Rochester, NY and graduated from The Citadel in 1979 with a bachelor's degree in history. Initially assigned as an artillery officer with 10th Marine Regiment, he was subsequently transferred to the 2nd Reconnaissance Battalion, Second Marine Division. During this assignment, he deployed as the reconnaissance platoon commander with Battalion Landing Team 3/8, 24th MAU, as part of the Multinational Force in Beirut, Lebanon.

Promoted to Captain, he was assigned to Marine Barracks Washington, D.C. where he served as Headquarters Company executive officer, company commander and as the barracks assistant operations officer. He was also a White House Social Aide. Following this tour, he attended the Amphibious Warfare School in Quantico, VA. Upon graduation, Brigadier General Lariviere served as a weapons company and rifle company commander with Battalion Landing Team 1/8, 24th MEU (SOC) on two deployments to the Mediterranean Sea. At the conclusion of this assignment, Captain Lariviere was transferred to Landing Force Training Command (Atlantic) in Little Creek, VA, where he taught small boat navigation, coxswain skills, and raid operations.

Brigadier General Lariviere transferred to the Marine Corps Reserve in 1991. Initially, he served as an instructor with the Marine Corps University's Law of War Detachment and on the staff of the School of Advanced Warfighting. From 1994 to 1996 he served as an assistant operations officer with the Second MAGTF Augmentation Command Element participating in Exercise BATTLE GRIFFIN-96. Recalled to active duty in January 2002 in support of Operation ENDURING FREEDOM, Brigadier General Lariviere served as the future operations officer and subsequently Assistant Chief of Staff G-3 Operations, 4th Marine Expeditionary Brigade (Anti-Terrorism). Upon demobilization, he served briefly with the Joint Forces Command IMA Detachment before joining the MAGTF Staff Training Program IMA Detachment as the Assistant Chief of Staff J-3. From July 2004 to September 2006 he was assigned as the Assistant Division Commander, 4th Marine Division. Recalled to active duty again in June 2006, Brigadier General Lariviere served with the Combined Security Transition Assistance Command-Afghanistan as the mentor/advisor to the G-3, Afghan National Army. Upon his release from active duty, he returned to duty with the 4th Marine Division staff. He was selected for Brigadier General in 2008.

Brigadier General Lariviere holds a Masters Degree in National Security Affairs from Georgetown University. He is a graduate of the Amphibious Warfare School, Marine Corps Command and Staff College (Non-Resident) and the Air War College (Seminar Program). His personal awards include the Bronze Star Medal, Meritorious Service Medal with one gold star, the Navy-Marine Corps Commendation Medal with three gold stars and the Joint Service Achievement Medal. 


