

ASHY, JOSEPH W., GENERAL, U.S. AIR FORCE (RETIRED)



General Joe Ashy graduated from Texas A&M University with a degree in mechanical engineering. After commissioning, he attended flying school at Reese AFB, Texas, and gunnery school at Luke AFB, Arizona. His first assignment was to the 494th Tactical Fighter Squadron at RAF Lakenheath, England. He flew 289 combat missions in Southeast Asia with the 3rd Tactical Wing. Other aircraft he has flown operationally include the A-7, F-4, F-5 and F-16. He served in various staff positions: at HQ USAF as a division chief in the deputate of plans and operations; as executive officer to the Air Force Chief of Staff; and, at Tactical Air command (TAC) Headquarters as IG, chief of staff, director of plans, director of operations, and later as the vice commander. He was the operations officer of an F-4 squadron in Korea, commanded an F-4 fighter squadron, two fighter wings (the 37th Tactical Fighter Wing "Wild Weasels" and the 57th Fighter Weapons Wing at Nellis AFB), the USAF Fighter Weapons Center, 16th Air Force, two Air Force major commands (Air Training Command and Air Force Space Command), a theater component command (NATO's AIRSOUTH), and two combined/joint commands (NORAD and U.S. Space Command). Before assuming command of the latter, he commanded NATO air forces in the Mediterranean theater and directed the combat air operations over the Balkans/Bosnia. Before his retirement in October 1996, he was "triple hatted" as CINCNORAD, CINCUSSPACECOM and COMAFSPC. He is a command pilot with over 3500 hours in fighter and attack aircraft. Decorations include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal with oak leaf cluster, the Silver Star and the Distinguished Flying Cross with oak leaf cluster.

Currently, he is President of Ashy & Associates, L.L.C. and is a consultant for several aerospace firms. Besides being a senior fellow for CAPSTONE, he serves in the Independent Strategic Assessment Group (ISAG) process for the commanders of NORTHCOM/NORAD and Air Force Space Command. He also participates in other ongoing analyses projects including reviews of missile defense, space launch, global positioning services, and joint command and control integration.


GENERAL KEVIN P. CHILTON

Gen. Kevin P. Chilton retired as the Commander, U.S. Strategic Command, Offutt Air Force Base, Neb. He was responsible for the plans and operations for all U.S. forces conducting strategic deterrence and Department of Defense space and cyberspace operations.

General Chilton is a distinguished graduate of the U.S. Air Force Academy and a Columbia University Guggenheim Fellow. A distinguished graduate from the U.S. Air Force pilot training and test pilot Schools, he flew operational assignments in the RF-4C and F-15 and weapons testing in the F-4 and F-15. The general also served 11 years at the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and commanded STS-76, his third space shuttle mission.

The general has commanded at the wing, numbered air force, major command and unified combatant command levels.



Gen Chilton currently serves as a Capstone Senior Fellow at the National Defense University (NDU) and as a mentor for the Defense Science Study Group at the Institute for Defense Analysis (IDA). He is a Director for the Anadarko Petroleum Corporation, HDT Global, and the Orbital Sciences Corporation and a Trustee for the Aerospace Corporation. Additionally, he supports the Air Force Academy on the Boards of the Falcon Foundation and Association of Graduates.

BRIGADIER GENERAL WILLIAM B. BINGER

Brigadier General William B. Binger is the Commander, 10th Air Force, Naval Air Station Fort Worth Joint Reserve Base, Texas. His command includes all fighter, bomber, special operations, rescue, airborne warning and control, flying training, combat air operations battle staff, remotely piloted aircraft, space and cyber units in the Air Force Reserve Command. When mobilized, or used in a full-time or part-time capacity, these units provide reserve combat capability to Air Combat Command, Air Force Special Operations Command, Pacific Air Forces, Air Force Space Command, Air Force Global Strike Command, Air Education and Training Command and the Air Force Intelligence, Surveillance and Reconnaissance Agency.



General Binger entered the Air Force on active duty in 1981. He earned his pilot wings in 1982 and graduated from fighter weapons school in 1988. He served on active duty from 1981 to 1996 and joined the Air Force Reserve in 1996 as an Active Guard Reserve member, and in 2007 he became an Air Reserve Technician. Throughout

his career, General Binger has held several senior supervisory positions and has commanded at the group, wing and center level.

General Binger is a command pilot with more than 4,500 hours in the F-16, including 40 combat missions over Iraq.

BRIGADIER GENERAL ANTHONY J. COTTON

Brig. Gen. Anthony J. Cotton is the Commander, 45th Space Wing, and Director, Eastern Range, Patrick Air Force Base, Fla. He is responsible for the processing and launching of U.S. government and commercial satellites from Cape Canaveral Air Force Station, Fla. He is also the final approval authority for all launches on the Eastern Range, a 15-million-square-mile area that supports an average of 15 launches per year aboard Delta, Atlas, Falcon, Navy and emerging launch vehicles. In addition, he manages wing launch and range infrastructure supporting NASA, commercial and missile test missions.



General Cotton entered the Air Force through the Reserve Officer Training Corps program in 1986. He started his career as a missile officer and has assumed various positions. He previously commanded at the squadron, group and wing levels. He also served as a command inspector while assigned to 20th Air Force and as an Executive Officer to the Commander, 14th Air Force. As Commander, 3rd Space Launch Squadron, he was responsible for the launch operations of Atlas II AS medium and Titan-IVB heavy launch vehicles. The general also served as a Wing Vice Commander, Deputy Operations Group Commander and as the Deputy Director, Secretary and Chief of Staff of the Air Force Executive Action Group, and Senior Military Assistant to the Under Secretary of Defense for Intelligence. He was the Commander of the Space Operations Group, as well as the Deputy Site Commander of a 3,000-plus-person satellite ground station responsible for the day-to-day and long-term mission success of several multi-billion-dollar national space programs.

Prior to his current assignment, General Cotton served as the Commander, 341st Missile Wing, Malmstrom Air Force Base, Mont., responsible for the operation, maintenance and security of the intercontinental ballistic missile force in central Montana. The wing provides deterrence for the nation by operating a force of 4,000 personnel and 150 Minuteman III ICBMs located throughout a 13,800-square-mile complex.

Rear Adm. Grady is a native of Newport, R.I. He is a graduate of the University of Notre Dame, and was commissioned as an ensign through the Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps program.

Grady's initial sea tour was aboard USS *Moosbrugger* (DD 980) where he served as combat information center officer and anti-submarine warfare officer. As a department head, he served as weapons control officer and combat systems officer aboard USS *Princeton* (CG 59). He was commanding officer of Mine Counter Measure Rotational Crew Echo aboard USS *Chief* (MCM 14), and deployed to the Arabian Gulf in command of USS *Ardent* (MCM 12). Grady then commanded USS *Cole* (DDG 67) deploying as part of NATO's Standing Naval Forces Mediterranean. He then commanded Destroyer Squadron 22 deploying to the Arabian Gulf as sea combat commander for the *Theodore Roosevelt* Carrier Strike Group in support of Operations *Enduring Freedom* and *Iraqi Freedom*.



Ashore, Grady first served on the staff of the Joint Chiefs of Staff and then as naval aide to the Chief of Naval Operations. He also served on the staff of the Chief of Naval Operations as assistant branch head, Europe and Eurasia Politico-Military Affairs Branch (OPNAV N524). He then served as executive assistant to the Navy's Chief of Legislative Affairs. Next, he served as the deputy executive secretary of the National Security Council in the White House. His last assignment was executive assistant to the Chief of Naval Operations. In October 2011, he reported to Commander, U.S. Pacific Fleet as deputy chief of staff for Operations, Training and Readiness.

Grady is a distinguished graduate of Georgetown University where he earned a Master of Arts degree in National Security Studies while concurrently participating as a Fellow in Foreign Service at the Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service. He is also a distinguished graduate of the National War College earning a Master of Science degree in National Security Affairs.

His personal awards include the Defense Superior Service Medal, the Legion of Merit with one gold star, the Meritorious Service Medal with three gold stars, Joint Service Commendation Medal, Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal with three gold stars and the Combat "V", and the Joint Service Achievement Medal. Grady is a joint specialty officer.

BRIGADIER GENERAL DAVID A. HARRIS

Brig. Gen. David A. Harris is Commander, 96th Test Wing, Air Force Materiel Command, Eglin Air Force Base, Fla--the largest wing in the Air Force. He leads more than 9,600 military, civilian, and contractor personnel, in accomplishing the Test Wing's missions of developmental testing and evaluation of conventional munitions, command and control systems, aircraft avionics and guidance systems, and radar cross section measurement. He is also responsible for providing all base operating support, infrastructure, and services support for the Department of Defense's largest installation (724 sq miles). He commands seven groups and 40 squadrons. The Test Wing operates 26 modified test aircraft; manages 185,500 square miles of over-water test ranges, plus facilities in six different states. The 96th TW also supports, seven tenant wings and wing equivalent units--to include the 33rd Fighter Wing (F-35 Joint Strike Fighter), the Army's 7th Special Forces Group (Airborne), Joint Explosive Ordnance Disposal Training Center-- and 42 other associate units including the Army's 6th Ranger Training Battalion and the the Air Force's 20th Space Control Squadron. As commander, he interacts with local officials across a three-county, 11-city region with a military economic impact of \$1.8 billion annually.



General Harris was commissioned in 1986 after completing Brigham Young University's Air Force ROTC program as a distinguished graduate. He has held various assignments in flying units including instructor and evaluator electronic warfare officer in the EF-111A, and experimental flight test weapon systems officer in the B-1B. He has also served as a legislative fellow with the 106th U.S. Congress and in a joint-staff assignment as Chief of Current Operations at U.S. Forces, Japan.

He has served as director of the Global Power Bomber Combined Test Force and commanded the 419th Flight Test Squadron at Edwards AFB, Calif. He is a graduate of Air War College, and has served as deputy director of the Air Force Research Laboratory's Materials and Manufacturing Directorate and as special assistant for Base Realignment and Closure at Headquarters AFMC. General Harris also served as Commander of the 46th Test Group at Holloman AFB, N.M.
