



General William L. "Spider" Nyland, USMC (Ret.)

General William L. "Spider" Nyland served as the Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps, Headquarters Marine Corps, Washington, D.C. from September 2002 until September 2005. He retired from active duty 1 November 2005.

General Nyland was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Marine Corps under the NROTC program upon graduation from the University of New Mexico in 1968. In addition to attaining an M.S. degree from the University of Southern California (1980), his formal military education includes The Basic School (1968), Naval Aviation Flight Training (NFO) (1969), Amphibious Warfare School (1975), Navy Fighter Weapons School (TopGun) (1977), College of Naval Command and Staff, Naval War College (1981), and Air War College (1988).

After being assigned to VMFA-531, General Nyland was ordered to Vietnam where he flew 122 combat missions with VMFA-314 and VMFA-115. In later tours of duty he flew additional combat sorties in Kosovo, Iraq and Afghanistan. General Nyland had multiple operational squadron tours and saw duty as the Congressional Liaison/Budget Officer, Headquarters, U.S. Marine Corps, Washington, D.C. In 1984 he served as the Operations Officer, Marine Aircraft Group-24, 1st Marine Amphibious Brigade, and he then commanded VMFA-232, the Marine Corps' oldest and most decorated fighter squadron, from July 1985 to July 1987.

General Nyland subsequently served as section chief for the Central Command section, European Command/Central Command Branch, Joint Operations Division, Directorate of Operations (J-3), Joint Staff, Washington, D.C. In July 1990, he assumed command of Marine Aviation Training Support Group (MATSG), Pensacola. Following his command of MATSG he assumed duties as Chief of Staff, 2nd Marine Aircraft Wing (2dMAW) on July 5, 1992, and assumed additional duties as Assistant Wing Commander on November 10, 1992. Promoted to Brigadier General on September 1, 1994, he was assigned as Assistant Wing Commander, 2d MAW serving in that billet until December 1, 1995.

He served next on the Joint Staff, J-8, as the Deputy Director for Force Structure and Resources, completing that tour on June 30, 1997. He was advanced to Major General on July 2, 1997, and assumed duties as the Deputy Commanding General, II Marine Expeditionary Force, Camp Lejeune, N.C. He served next as the Commanding General, 2d Marine Aircraft Wing, MCAS Cherry Point, North Carolina from July 1998 to June 2000. He was advanced to Lieutenant General on 30 June 2000 and assumed duties as the Deputy Commandant for Programs and Resources, Headquarters, U.S. Marine Corps. He next assumed duties as the Deputy Commandant for Aviation on 3 August 2001. He was advanced to General on 4 September 2002 and assumed his duties as the Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps on 10 September 2002.

Upon retirement he returned to Pensacola, FL, where he offers consulting services from his home office. He is a former fellow for the Institute of Defense & Business and served in an

instructional role for Duke University (College of Continuing Education) in leadership training performed in support of BAE for four years. He is active as a Senior Mentor for the National Defense University in the “Capstone”, “Keystone” and “Pinnacle” programs. He currently serves as the Chairman of the Board for the Marine Corps Scholarship Foundation and formerly served as the Chairman for the Marine Corps Toys for Tots Foundation. He also served as The National Commander for the Marine Corps Aviation Association from Jan 2007 - Jan 2010.

Rear Adm. Andrews was assigned as the director, Total Force Requirements Division (OPNAV N12) in September 2011.

As a Navy human resources officer, her assignments have been primarily in the areas of manpower, personnel, training and education. Upon commissioning through the Naval Reserve Officers Training Corps at Savannah State University, Andrews began her career at Naval Station Whiting Field with assignments to Training Air Wing Five, and Helicopter Training Squadron Eight. Other assignments and staff assignments included: director, Counseling and Assistance Center, Naval Air Station Keflavik, Iceland; officer-in-charge, Navy Personnel Support Activity Detachments Subic Bay and Cubi Point, United States Forces Philippines, Republic of the Philippines; branch head, Deserter Branch/Deserter Apprehension Program (PERS-842), Washington, D.C.; and, chief, Requirements Branch and Joint Manpower Planner, Manpower and Personnel Directorate Joint Staff, J-1 in Washington, D.C. She also served as executive assistant and naval aide to the Assistant Secretary of the Navy for Manpower and Reserves Affairs at the Pentagon in Washington, D.C. Prior to her assignment to OPNAV N12, she served as a Fellow on the Chief of Naval Operations Strategic Studies Group at the Naval War College, Newport, R.I.



Andrews served as commanding officer of three commands: Boston Military Entrance Processing Station, Boston; Navy Recruiting District San Francisco; and, Recruit Training Command (RTC), Great Lakes, Ill. ♦ During her tour at RTC, she led the training efforts of over 100,000 Sailors for duty in the Fleet, and was instrumental in the commissioning of the Navy's only immersive simulator trainer, the USS *Trayer* also known as Battle Stations 21.

Andrews, a native of Midway, Ga., received a Bachelor of Science Degree in Criminal Justice from Savannah State University and a Master of Science Degree in Management from Troy State University. ♦ She has been conferred an Honorary Doctorate Degree in Humane Letters from Wilson College in Chambersburg, Pa. Her military education includes a master's degree in National Security and Strategic Studies from the College of Naval Command and Staff, Naval War College. She also graduated from the Joint Forces Staff College and is designated a joint qualified officer.

Her Navy decorations include: the Legion of Merit with one Gold Star; Defense Meritorious Service Medal with one oak leaf cluster; Meritorious Service Medal; Joint Service Commendation Medal; Navy and Marine Corps Commendation Medal with two Gold Stars; Joint Service Achievement Medal, and various other unit citations.

Brig. Gen. Stephen A. Clark is the Director of Plans, Programs, Requirements, and Assessments, Headquarters Air Force Special Operations Command, Hurlburt Field, Fla. He ensures the 16,000 Air Commandos worldwide are resourced and equipped through force structure planning and programming, establishing requirements, technology development, operational test and evaluation, and acquisition program oversight through U.S. Air Force and U.S. Special Operations Command processes.

General Clark was commissioned through the Air Force ROTC program in 1986 from the University of Tennessee, Knoxville. During his 24 years of active-duty service, he has served as a class commander, assistant director of operations, chief of current operations, chief of safety, and chief pilot. He has also been the chief of AFSOC Operations requirements, executive officer to both the AFSOC vice commander and commander, chief of SOF contingency plans and programs for the Air Staff, senior USSOCOM LNO to the National Counterterrorism Center, and Commander 4th Special Operations Squadron, Commander CFSOCC CJSOAC, and Commander 27 Special Operations Wing.



General Clark is a command pilot with more than 3,500 hours in 13 aircraft. He has flown combat missions in Somalia, Bosnia, Haiti, Afghanistan, and Iraq.

He formulates policy, manages agency resources, and leads operational activities to accomplish DSS's mission. Mr. Kren is responsible for the Agency's innovation efforts, ensuring future program viability and continuity.

Prior to his assignment to DSS, Mr. Kren served as the Director of Innovation and Collaboration, Intelligence Systems Support Office (ISSO), Office of the Secretary of the Air Force. The ISSO supports the initiatives and activities of the Office of the Under Secretary of Defense for Intelligence. During his tenure with ISSO, he was assigned to the North Atlantic Treaty Organization (NATO) in Brussels, Belgium, first as special advisor to the Assistant Secretary General for Defense Investment from 2006-2008 and then as General Manager of the Battlefield Information Collection and Exploitation Systems (BICES) Agency from 2008-2011. In that capacity, he directed the agency's mission of enabling and enhancing multinational intelligence sharing and exchange.



In 1987, Mr. Kren began his career with the Defense Mapping Agency (DMA), later the National Imagery and Mapping Agency (NIMA). Brigadier General Sanborn was commissioned in May 1986 after graduating from the University of Florida on a NROTC scholarship. Upon completion of The Basic School, he reported to NAS Pensacola, FL for primary flight instruction and earned his wings in October 1988 at NAS Meridian, MS.

Brigadier General Sanborn reported to MCAS Cherry Point, NC for AV-8B transition training in November 1988. His initial assignment was to VMA-231, where he served in both operational and maintenance billets. While serving with VMA-231 he completed two deployments, first to Iwakuni, Japan and then to Southwest Asia, where he participated in Operation Desert Storm. On 9 February 1991, Captain Sanborn was shot down by a surface-to-air missile over southern Kuwait during his 17th combat mission. He was captured and held as an Iraqi POW until his release on 6 March 1991.



In July 1992, Brigadier General Sanborn reported to 1st Battalion, 8th Marines, Camp Lejeune, NC where he served as a Forward Air Controller. During this tour, he received a Master of Science in Business Administration from Boston University in December 1992.

In July 1993, Brigadier General Sanborn returned to MCAS Cherry Point, NC where he was assigned to VMA-542 and was selected as a cadre member of the Fleet Introduction Team, which introduced the new AV-8B Harrier II+ to the USMC. In March 1994, Brigadier General Sanborn was reassigned to VMA-231 where he again served in both operational and maintenance billets. In June 1996, Brigadier General Sanborn deployed to the Mediterranean Sea with the first AV-8B Harrier II+ detachment as part of HMM-365 and the 26th Marine Expeditionary Unit. During this deployment, he took part in combat operations Joint Endeavor, Silverwake, and Guardian Retrieval.

Returning to CONUS in June 1997, Brigadier General Sanborn was ordered to Naval Air Systems Command in Patuxent River, MD where he served as the Assistant Program Manager for Systems Engineering for the AV-8B. In July 2000, he attended the resident Marine Corps Command and Staff College in Quantico, VA and in July 2001 Brigadier General Sanborn returned to MCAS Cherry Point, NC for duty as the Executive Officer of VMA- 542. In January 2003, he returned to Iraq with the squadron and participated in combat operations Southern Watch and Iraqi Freedom.

Upon returning from OIF in May 2003, Brigadier General Sanborn was reassigned to MAG-14 as the Group Operations Officer. He slated for command of VMA-542 and returned to the squadron in April 2004 prior to the squadron's redeployment to Iraq for OIF II. Brigadier General Sanborn assumed command of VMA-542 in June 2004 while the squadron was deployed at Al Asad, Iraq. During his tour, VMA-542 won the Lawson H.M.
