General Michael J. Williams

General Williams was born in Baltimore, MD and enlisted in the Navy in 1960. He was commissioned a second lieutenant upon graduation from the U.S. Naval Academy in June 1967 and subsequently completed Naval Flight Training and was designated a Naval Aviator.



General Williams' operational tours include various squadron assignments in the United States, Republic of Vietnam, and Okinawa; Presidential Helicopter Pilot with Marine Helicopter Squadron One; executive officer Headquarters and Maintenance Squadron 16; commanding officer of Marine Helicopter Training Squadron 301; 2d Marine Aircraft Wing Inspector; executive and commanding officer of Marine Air Group 26, serving as commanding officer during Desert Shield and Desert Storm; assistant Division G-3 for 3d Marine Division and Commanding General of 2d Force Service Support Group and Commander Joint Task Force 160, responsible for providing humanitarian relief for Haitian and Cuban immigrants in Guantanamo Naval Base, Cuba.

His staff assignments include: company officer and executive assistant to the Commandant of Midshipmen at the U.S. Naval Academy; Marine Corps Program Development Officer and branch head in Requirements and Programs Division, Headquarters Marine Corps; Vice Director for Operational Plans and Interoperability, J-7, Joint Staff; Director of the Marine Corps Staff, Headquarters Marine Corps; Commander, Marine Corps Systems Command and Deputy Chief of Staff for Programs and Resources. He retired in 2002 after serving as the Assistant Commandant of the Marine Corps.

He is a graduate of the Marine Corps' Amphibious Warfare School and Command and Staff College. He holds a Bachelor of Science degree from the U.S. Naval Academy and Masters degrees from the University of Southern California and the College of Naval Warfare. His personal decorations include: the Defense Superior Service Medal with palm; Legion of Merit with gold star; Bronze Star Medal with Combat "V"; the Meritorious Service Medal; Air Medal with Strike Flight Numerals "25" and bronze star; and Navy Commendation Medal with gold star and Combat "V".

CAPTAIN FRANK E. PAGANO, USN (Ret)



Captain Pagano is a native of Baltimore, Maryland graduating from Brooklyn Park high school in 1973. He was accepted into the U.S. Naval Academy and entered with the Class of 1977 in July 1973. He graduated in June, 1977 with a Bachelor of Science degree in Aerospace Engineering, a Varsity letter in soccer and a commission in the Navy. His first assignment was to Pensacola, Florida for flight training in July 1977.

After earning Wings of Gold in September 1978 he reported to the Fleet Replacement Squadron for the SH-2F, HSL-31, in San Diego California. He completed the required course of study in May 1979 and reported to his first fleet assignment, HSL-37, Barbers Point Hawaii in June 1979.

During his tour in HSL-37, Captain Pagano completed two Western Pacific/Indian Ocean Deployments. He was cited as an AIRPAC PRO OF THE WEEK for saving an SH-2 after a catastrophic engine failure and in-flight fire while performing a hoist transfer to a surface combatant.

Captain Pagano's next assignment was HSL-41 Pre-establishment Unit, San Diego, in June 1982. While assigned to the "Seahawks" he attended initial instructor factory training and became one of the first instructor pilots in the SH-60B.

He reported to HSL-43, San Diego, in July 1985 as a detachment Assistant OIC and Maintenance Officer. He "fleeted-up" to OIC of Detachment Two in November 1985 and became the first West Coast two aircraft SH-60B detachment OIC. Detachment two was assigned to the USS Curts (FFG-38) and Destroyer Squadron 31 during Commander Pagano's tour.

In August 1987 he was assigned to the Chief of Naval Operations' staff specifically, the Vice Chief of Naval Operations, Air Warfare, Washington D.C. He served as the Research, Development, Test and Evaluation budget analyst for Air Warfare.

August 1989 saw Captain Pagano return to San Diego as the Maintenance Officer for the HSL-49 Pre-Establishment unit. After squadron Establishment he served as the aircraft Maintenance Officer and as detachment Safety Observer for the squadron's first two detachments. He screened for Operational Aviation Command in June 1990 and reported to HSL-43 as the Executive Officer in February 1991.

Captain Pagano took command of HSL-43 in February 1992.

After a successful command tour, Captain Pagano reported to the USS TRIPOLI (LPH-10) in May, 1993 as Air Boss. During his tour, TRIPOLI was awarded the Admiral Flatley Award for Aviation Safety and the ship CNO Safety Award. He completed a Western Pacific/Indian Ocean deployment during which TRIPOLI was the Flag Ship for Operation Vigilant Warrior, the second defense of Kuwait. Captain Pagano became TRIPOLI's last Executive Officer in February 1995.

Upon TRIPOLI's decommissioning in September 1995, Captain Pagano reported for duty as the LAMPS Requirements Officer for the Director, Air Warfare, Chief of Naval Operations Staff in Washington DC.

Captain Pagano completed Senior Service School at the Industrial College of the Armed Forces (ICAF) in June of 1999 as a Distinguished Graduate.

Captain Pagano reported to the National Defense University as the Navy Deputy Director of the CAPSTONE General and Flag Officer Joint Professional Military Education course in July of 1999. He assumed the duties as the Director of CAPSTONE in July of 2000.

Captain Pagano's decorations include the Defense Superior Service Medal, four Meritorious Service Medals, two Navy Commendation medals and various unit and campaign awards.

Captain Pagano was placed on the roles of the Fleet Reserve on the first of August 2003. He was hired as the first civilian director of the Capstone program in July of 2003 where he continues to serve. During his active duty and civilian tenure as the Director, Capstone, Frank has had the privilege of shepherding over 1500 of the Nation's newest Senior Executives, Flag and General Officers through the course.

Frank is married to the former Myra Sobecki of Michigan City, Indiana. They have two children Nicholas, 25, and Callie, 23.

Colonel Arnold K. Veazie is the Deputy Director of the CAPSTONE General/Flag Officer program for Overseas Field Studies. In his current position, his portfolio includes strategic planning and execution of OCONUS field studies to enhance the Flag Officers' understanding of major regional security issues. His last assignment was Division Chief and Senior Program Manager for all software development and data management in support of the Army's Human Capital Mission, US Army Human Resources Command, Alexandria, Va. He has served in a wide variety of assignments to include logistics, information systems, and acquisition management, both in CONUS and overseas.

Early in his career, COL Veazie served as Logistics Staff Officer Army Materiel Command, Alexandria, Virginia; Supply Platoon Leader and Property Book Officer, 45th Aviation Intermediate Maintenance Company, 19th Theater Support Command, Korea; Supply and Service Officer, 194th Maintenance Battalion, 19th Theater Support Command, Korea; Supply and Operations Officer in the northern European port of Bremerhaven Germany, Military Traffic Management Command; and Commander, 493rd Supply and Service Company, 2nd Corps Support Command, 7th US Corps.

Other key assignments include: Operational Test and Evaluation Officer for Army Information Systems, US Army Operational Test and Evaluation Command, Alexandria, Virginia, 1991 to 1993; Executive Officer, 2nd Forward Support Battalion in the forward deployed 2nd Infantry Division, 8th Army Korea, 1994 to 1995; Information Systems/Materiel Management Officer (AC/RC assignment) 321st Theater Materiel Management Center, in support of the 3rd US Army's ARCENT mission in Southwest Asia, 1995 to 1998; Army Staff Officer and Project Manager, G4, the Pentagon, responsible for Year 2000 compliance of all logistics systems, 1998 to 2000; subsequently, he provided departmental level management and oversight of all global IT development efforts. In the aftermath of the events of 11 September 2001, he was detailed to the Army Operations Center, Crisis Action Team, supporting the Pentagon's recovery operations, Homeland Defense, and Operation Enduring Freedom.

A native of Opelousas, Louisiana, he holds a Bachelors of Science degree in Computer Science from Alabama A&M University and a Masters of Strategic Studies from the United States Army War College. His military education includes the Quartermaster Officers Basic and Advanced Course, the Combined Arms Services Staff School, the Army's Computer Science School, the Command and General Staff College, and the United States Army War College.

Brig. Gen. Michael J. Carey is the Deputy Director, Global Operations, Global Operations Directorate, U.S. Strategic Command, Offutt Air Force Base, Neb. He is responsible to the commander on matters of situational awareness, command and control, and integrated plans and operations across space, nuclear and cyber operations.

General Carey enlisted in the Air Force in 1978 and was later commissioned through the Reserve Officer Training Corps in 1983 at the University of Central Florida. He has operated the 5D-2 Defense Meteorological Support Program weather satellite, giant sapphire space surveillance radar, Atlas I/II/IIA rockets, Colorado Tracking Station, the Minuteman III intercontinental ballistic missile, and Red Bear and Red Owl GPS jammers. He has also served as Director of Space Forces with deployment experience in support of the Central Air Force Commander.

United States Navy Biography

Rear Admiral Sandy Daniels Director, Warfare Integration on the Chief of Naval Operations staff (N6F).

Rear Admiral Sandy Daniels entered the U.S. Naval Academy in June 1976 and was commissioned as an ensign in May 1980.

Daniels began flight training at Naval Air Station Pensacola, Fla., in January 1981 and was designated as a Naval aviator in January 1982. Upon completion of pilot training, she reported to her first fleet assignment with Oceanographic Research Squadron (VXN) 8. While at VXN 8, she flew specially configured research P-3 Orions on missions worldwide.

Daniels was then assigned to the Naval Research Laboratory where, in addition to flying research missions, she was a military liaison to the Space Science Division, supporting a proof-of-concept space project and earned her Space Operations subspecialty designation. She then was assigned to the Naval Space Surveillance Center in Dahlgren, Va., where she was the fleet support officer and later the operational requirements division head. She completed the Alternate Space Surveillance Center and Alternate Space Defense Operations Center crew commander qualifications, directing watch teams responsible for processing space events and directing the worldwide space surveillance network. She left active duty in October 1991, and was commissioned in the Naval Reserves.



Daniels held numerous billets in the Space & Network Warfare (SPAWAR) Program, including with SPAWAR Space Field Activity units supporting the National Reconnaissance Office, before assuming command of Naval Reserve (NR) Naval Space Command 0766 as the plank owner commanding officer in December, 1998. During this time, she also worked on her Master of Arts degree in Science, Technology and Public Policy (Space Policy emphasis) from The George Washington University, completing it in 1996.

Daniels was then assigned as executive officer of NR Space and Electronic Warfare 0666 supporting N6. She assumed command of NR SPAWAR HQ 0866 as the plank owning commanding officer in September 2001. She was then selected for NR Strategic Command 0188 to support J5 on space plans and policy issues in 2003. Daniels was designated a Navy Space Cadre Expert (AQD VS4) in January 2006. She served as the director, Navy Space & Network Warfare Program from October 2005 through September 2007. She was then assigned as the reserve assistant communication Networks on the Chief of Naval Operations' staff (N6R).

Effective July 2008, she is director, Warfare Integration on the Chief of Naval Operations' staff (N6F).

Bruce Hardcastle was named Defense Intelligence Officer (DIO) for the Middle East and North Africa concurrent with DIA's reestablishment of DIOs parallel to the National Intelligence Officer structure in May 2008. He and the other six regional DIOs are the defense intelligence community's senior substantive experts for their regions of the world. They speak on behalf of the Director, DIA, in intelligence community fora, representing the intelligence views of combatant commands, service intelligence centers, and DIA. They support senior Department of Defense customers, guide defense intelligence analysis on enduring issues, and develop overall strategies for foreign relationships.

Bruce Hardcastle was appointed to the Defense Intelligence Senior Level in March 2001. From 2001 through 2003 he was the DIO for the Middle East and South Asia. From July 2004 through June 2005 he served in Iraq, where he was Chief of the Coalition's Combined Intelligence Operations Center.

From October 2006 through May 2008 he served as the Agency's Senior Defense Intelligence Analyst for the Middle East.

After graduate studies in Middle East History and Arabic at Georgetown University and the American University in Cairo, Egypt, Bruce Hardcastle worked at the National Archives and served as the U.S. Army's Deputy Assistant Chief of Military History. During this period, he published numerous articles on Middle East and military history topics. He joined the Defense Intelligence Agency in 1986.

From 1986 until his appointment as Defense Intelligence Officer for the Middle East and South Asia in 2001, Bruce Hardcastle served in a variety of DIA positions, including Current Intelligence Officer; Chief, Middle East Political-Military Section; Senior Intelligence Officer of the Middle East and North Africa Branch; Deputy Defense Intelligence Officer for the Middle

East, South Asia and Terrorism; and Senior Intelligence Officer of the Office for Middle East and Africa Regional Military Assessments. He was one of the Intelligence Community's early innovators in the use of "red cells" to predict adversary actions and reactions.

Bruce Hardcastle has received the DIA Director's Award (2), the DIA Award for Meritorious Civilian Service, the DIA Civilian Expeditionary Medal, the U.S. Army Commander's Award for Civilian Service (2), and other military and civilian commendations. He is a 1995 graduate of the National War College (Masters in National Security Strategy); an alumnus of the Intelligence Fellows Program, the Intelligence Community Senior Leadership Program, the Maxwell School's National Security Studies program at Syracuse University, and the Kellogg School of Management's IC Executive Leadership Program at Northwestern University; and a former US Marine.

Bruce Hardcastle and his wife, Trudy, live in Virginia with their three children, Marshall, Lewis and Ivy.

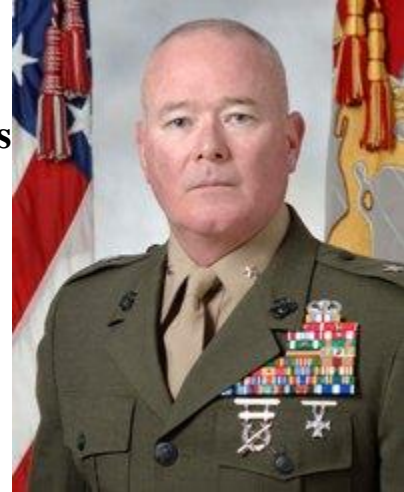

Brigadier General Walter Lee Miller, Jr. graduated from Texas A&M and was commissioned a 2d lieutenant in Dec 1979 via the NROTC program. He completed TBS and IOC in Oct 1980 and was assigned to B Co, 1st Bn, 3d Mar. There he served as both rifle and weapons platoon commander, as well as the company XO. He was later assigned to the battalion's operations section completing his tour in Oct 1983. His next assignment was to TBS where he held both SPC and Tactics instructor billets from 1983 to 1986.

Following this assignment he was ordered to the Amphibious Warfare School where he graduated with honors, as well as being chosen as the ground honor graduate, earning the Capt Larry B. Shipman award.

Following AWS he returned to the operating force in 1987 until 1991, and was assigned as C Company Commander in 1st Bn, 6th Mar. During this tour he deployed to Okinawa and later to the Republic of Panama in support of Freedom of Movement in the Canal Zone under MARFORPANAMA. He also served as the Regiment's Assistant Operations Officer and later as Commander of the UNITAS Rifle Company. Following his return from UNITAS he was sent to Incirlik, Turkey as an LNO in support of Provide Comfort. Brigadier General Miller's next assignment was to PP&O, SOLIC, HQMC from 1991-1994. He then was sent to Command and Staff College, Quantico, Virginia. Following Command and Staff College, he was assigned to MARFORSOUTH Liaison Element in the Republic of Panama from 1995-1998. There he served as the G5, later as the G3 and finally as the OIC.

Following Panama, Brigadier General Miller returned to Second Marine Division in the summer of 1998 until the summer of 2003. During this tour he served as the G3 Operations Officer, 2d Marine Regiment's XO and finally as Commanding Officer of BLT 2/2. During BLT 2/2's deployment, they participated in operations in Kosovo, Djibouti and finally went ashore in March of 2003 in support of OIF I.

Upon completion of this tour with 2d Bn, 2d Marines he was posted as the Chief of Staff of 4th Marine Division in the summer of 2003. He then was ordered, in the summer of

2004, to report to III MEF, MARFORPAC in order to take command of 31st MEU and again was deployed to Iraq for OIF II where the MEU took charge of the AO Denver (Western Al Anbar) Operating Area. Upon return the MEU was deployed in a HS/DR mission to Leyte, The Republic of the Philippines, to support efforts following their disastrous mountain mud slide.

In the summer of 2006 Brigadier General Miller was then assigned as the Assistant Chief of Staff of US European Command and held that billet until re-assignment to Headquarters, MCCDC in the summer of 2008. He is now the director of the Joint Capabilities Assessment and Integration Directorate (JCAID), and is the Marine Corps representative to the Joint Capabilities Board.

Brigadier General Miller's awards include the Distinguished Superior Service Medal, Legion of Merit with Gold Star, Bronze Star with "V", Defense Meritorious Service Medal, Meritorious Service Medal with Gold Star, Navy Commendation Medal with Gold Star and the Navy Achievement Medal. Brigadier General Miller has a Masters Degree in Curriculum Design.

He is married to the former Marcela Davila and has three daughters and four Grand-children.
