PROBLEM NO. 21.

SUBJECT: Standardization and Changes in Design.

OBJECT: Changes in design in material in process work havoc with production. Such changes should, therefore, be kept to a minimum. Standardization and the use of commercial standards, where practicable, materially assist in securing and maintaining production. It is desired to have a general study made of the questions involved under the above subject.
