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| Understanding the Environment | Analyze national, transnational and international factors that shape policy and strategy <i>Courses 6500, 6600, and ISRP</i> |
| Conventional Warfare Paradigm | Develop a national strategy that exploits the full range of conventional military capabilities as appropriate in concert with other appropriate instruments of national power to deal with a given security challenge <i>Courses 6200, 6300, 6600 and ISRP</i> |
| Battle for the Narrative | Formulate a strategic communication plan that will work in concert with other instruments of national power to control the narrative in a national effort to deal with a given security challenge <i>Courses 6200, 6300, 6600 and ISRP</i> |
| Transitions | Develop a national strategy for a given security challenge that anticipates and provides for transitions as the strategic effort evolves <i>Course 6600 and ISRP</i> |
| Adaptation | Adjust a given national strategy when assumptions, estimations and/or judgments at the heart of the strategic design prove incorrect <i>Courses 6200, 6300, 6600 and ISRP</i> |
| SOF-GPF Integration | Develop a national strategy to deal with a given security challenge that exploits SOF and GPF as appropriate in an orchestrated scheme <i>Courses 6200, 6300, 6600 and ISRP</i> |
| Interagency Coordination | Assess the implications of the processes for formulating and implementing U.S. national security strategies and policies for the viability of a proposed strategy <i>Courses 6400, 6600 and ISRP</i> |
| Coalition Operations | Apply concepts and techniques for planning and conducting coalition operations as part of a national strategy <i>Courses 6200, 6300, 6600 and ISRP</i> |
| Host-Nation Partnering | Apply concepts and techniques for planning and conducting host-nation partnering efforts as part of a national strategy <i>Courses 6200, 6300, 6600 and ISRP</i> |
| State Use of Surrogates and Proxies | Identify the challenges states can present to U.S. national strategy through the use of surrogates and proxies <i>Courses 6200 and 6300</i> |
