

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Vice Admiral Jody A. Breckenridge United States Coast Guard (Retired)



Jody A. Breckenridge serves as the Chair of the California Military Council serving the state, military facilities, military personnel and their families serving in California and Defense Support Communities. As a board member, she serves the following agencies and nonprofits: Association for Rescue at Sea, Council for a Strong America, Marines Memorial Foundation, Mission Readiness: Military Leaders for Kids, Oakland Military Institute, San Francisco Fleet Week Association and U.S. Vets.

Ms. Breckenridge serves on the Board of First Command Financial Services and on an advisory Board to the Federal Employee Program Division of Blue Cross Blue Shield.

A retired three-star, Vice Admiral Breckenridge completed a 34-year career in the United States Coast Guard. In her last assignment as Pacific Area Commander, she served as one of the two senior field commanders, directing all operations across 73 million square miles of the Pacific. Additional flag assignments included Director of

Strategic Transformation guiding the largest reorganization and business practice realignment in the modern Coast Guard, Assistant Commandant for Human Resources with responsibility for all the workforces, pay and benefits, healthcare, awards and recognitions, housing, training and education, and Acquisition Official for training and human capital. As the Eleventh District Commander, the regional command achieved record drug interdictions including the arrest of the head of the Arellano Felix cartel. Her initial flag assignment was as Maintenance and Logistics Command Pacific leading all support and logistic systems supporting the Pacific Area Commander. As a flag officer, the Admiral participated in State Department programs in the countries of Georgia and Azerbaijan. She was a US representative for the North Pacific Coast Guard Forum and led meetings with the Russian Border Service.

Vice Admiral Breckenridge earned a Masters in National Security Strategy and Resource Management from ICAF (now the Dwight D Eisenhower School) of the National Defense University and a Masters of Public Policy from the University of Maryland (Honors). She was awarded a BS in Biology from Virginia Tech.

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Lieutenant General Charles W. Hooper United States Army (Retired)



Lieutenant General (Retired) Charles Hooper is one of America's most distinguished soldier-diplomats and known as a conceptual and analytical thinker, a consummate negotiator, a trusted advisor who effectively navigates complex, sensitive issues and challenges, and a catalyst for collaboration and cooperation. He is well-known and widely respected within the Departments of State and Defense, the Intelligence Community and among national security scholars.

Lieutenant General Hooper has over 40 years of experience in security policy formulation and execution; strategic intelligence; security cooperation; sensitive negotiations; foreign military sales; education and transformational leadership. A fluent Chinese linguist with almost seven years living and working in China, many considered him one of the Nation's foremost experts on the Chinese military and defense industries.

In addition to operational assignments with the 25th Infantry and 82nd Airborne Divisions and teaching Chinese Foreign Policy at the Naval Postgraduate School, Lieutenant General Hooper had three high profile diplomatic assignments including serving as the U.S. Defense Attaché—the senior U.S. military officer, in both China and Egypt. Lieutenant General Hooper also served as the senior DOD strategist and planner (J5) for U.S. Africa Command and deputy strategy and plans director for U.S. Indo-Pacific Command (Deputy J5), and as the senior China and Taiwan policy official in the Office of the Secretary of Defense.

In his final military assignment (2017-2020), he was Director of the Defense Security Cooperation Agency, responsible for the overseas sale of all weapons, military equipment, support services and training packages for the United States Government. In that capacity he served as the Department of Defense expert on U.S. security assistance funding and U.S. foreign military sales.

Lieutenant General Hooper is a graduate of the United States Military Academy, West Point (BS), and Harvard University Kennedy School of Government (MPA) where he received the Don K. Price Award for Academic Excellence and Public Service. He also holds a certificate in Chinese Language and Literature from the British Ministry of Defense Chinese Language School and returned to Harvard University as a post-graduate research fellow at the Weatherhead Center for International Affairs studying U.S.-China military relations.

Among his numerous honors, Lieutenant General Hooper was awarded the National Defense Medal by the French Government and was the first Army student-officer and first Harvard Kennedy School of Government student ever selected to give a Harvard University Commencement Address.

Lieutenant General Hooper is now a Senior Counselor with The Cohen Group, the Washington, D.C. consulting firm founded by former Secretary of Defense William Cohen. He is also a member of the National Bureau of Asian Research Board of Directors, a Senior Fellow at Harvard University's Belfer Center, a senior non-resident scholar at the Atlantic Council, and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations.



Dr. Christopher B. Howard Lieutenant Colonel, United States Air Force Reserve (Retired)



Dr. Chris Howard is the executive vice president and chief operating officer of ASU, A Public Enterprise. Howard works closely with President Crow and the other executive vice presidents to coordinate enterprise-wide initiatives and advancement, oversee ASU Enterprise affiliates, advance new enterprise relationships and opportunities, and integrate ASU Enterprise planning and strategy.

He is a distinguished graduate of the US Air Force Academy and earned a doctorate in politics as a Rhodes Scholar from the University of Oxford. He also has an MBA with distinction from Harvard Business School, and in 2018 received the school's Alumni Achievement Award. Howard's service to his country began as a helicopter pilot, then as an intelligence officer, where he was assigned to the elite Joint Special Operations Command. He served in Afghanistan in the Air Force Reserve and was awarded the Bronze Star. Howard concluded his career as a Reserve Military Attaché to Liberia, Africa.

Previously, Howard served as the eighth president of Robert Morris University, a nationally ranked doctoral granting university in suburban Pittsburgh, beginning on February 1, 2016.

Before serving at RMU, Howard was President of Hampden-Sydney College in Virginia.

Howard also served as vice president for Leadership & Strategic Initiatives at the University of Oklahoma. Previously he worked in General Electric's Corporate Initiatives Group and Bristol-Myers Squibb's Corporate Associates Program. Howard served on the National Security Education Board, appointed by President Barack Obama.

He is a trustee on the Harvard University Board of Overseers and also serves on the Board of Directors of AvalonBay Communities. Howard is a Henry Crown Fellow at the Aspen Institute, a member of the Council on Foreign Relations, the Young Presidents Organization, the Aspen Strategy Group and Trilateral Commission, and Sigma Pi Phi, the oldest African-American fraternity in the United States.

Howard won the Campbell Trophy, the nation's highest academic award for a senior college football player. He also is a member of the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics and a former member of the College Football Playoff Selection Committee.

Howard is the founder and a trustee emeritus of the Impact Young Lives Foundation, a nonprofit organization that supports South African youth.

His wife, Barbara Noble Howard, serves as an Arizona State University Fellow for nonprofit leadership. She also serves on several philanthropic boards and hails from South Africa. They have two adult sons, Cohen and Joshua.

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Dr. Suzanne Logan



Dr. Suzanne Logan is providing independent consulting/coaching services after retiring in 2022 from the Office of Personnel Management (OPM) where she was a member of the Senior Executive Service and most recently served as the Senior Advisor for the Associate Director, Employee Services. For the prior nine years at OPM, she served as Director of the Federal Executive Institute, the Director of the Center for Leadership Development (CLD) and the Deputy Associate Director of Human Resources Solutions. Operating within a yearly revolving-fund budget of over \$180M, she successfully led all aspects of the U.S. government's career-long professional leadership and management development programs. CLD's Continuum of Leadership and Professional Development, created by Dr. Logan, was delivered through FEI, the two management development centers in Washington, D.C. and Denver, Colorado, the SES Leading EDGE program, USALearning, OPM's Innovation Design Lab, the Presidential Management Fellows program, the Presidential Executive Fellows program, the International Leadership Development program, Performance and Process Improvement program, and the Federal

HR Institute. Each year under her leadership over 18 million development courses or programs were completed by the Federal workforce through these courses or programs.

Before joining FEI, Dr. Logan served as the U.S. Air Force's Chief Academic Officer for Officer Education, Spaatz Center and the Chief Academic Officer, Air War College at Air University, Maxwell Air Force Base, Alabama. She served on the J7 JPME educational advisory group, participated in updates to the CJCSI 1800 and led or participated in the joint accreditation processes of war colleges and staff colleges each year.

While working in private industry, Dr. Logan was Vice President of Academic Affairs for class.com, a private company formed by the University of Nebraska, where she held responsibilities for the development and delivery of a completely Internet-based worldwide academic program. Earlier, she served as a Regional Manager for Texas Instruments, Inc. where she developed training programs and oversaw the training for one-third of the country.

A seventeen-year academic administrator at Texas Tech University (TTU) and a member of the graduate faculty, Dr. Logan was the guiding force behind several groundbreaking academic initiatives, including the first virtual public school district in Texas, the university's first online Bachelor's and Master's degrees, and the largest kindergarten through Master's degree e-learning program in the country. She was one of the first members of Texas Tech's graduate faculty to teach courses using interactive video instruction and was the first to teach online courses over the worldwide web. She led the TTU to international prominence as a pacesetter in e-learning. Dr. Logan served regularly for over a decade as a peer consultant for the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and the Middle States Association during her university tenure and again while serving at Air University.





Dr. Logan holds a bachelor's degree from Midwestern State University and both a master's degree and a doctoral degree in higher education administration from TTU. She is a recipient of the TTU Distinguished Service Award. She has completed certificate programs from Harvard University, University of Georgia, University of North Carolina, and Center for Creative Leadership. Dr. Logan is an Academy Fellow of the congressionally chartered National Academy of Public Administration.

She servs as a member of the National Defense University Board of Visitors, the US Coast Guard Academy's Board of Trustees, and the Federal Acquisition Institute's Board of Directors. Dr. Logan has provided consultation services to organizations such as the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA), George Washington University, the US Air Force, the government of Colombia, and the European Union. She has written and presented extensively to national audiences on the topics of e-learning and career-long development.

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Colonel Nora Ramirez Marcos United States Army (Retired)



Colonel (Retired) Nora R. Marcos serves as a Service Delivery Leader at Cisco where she is responsible for delivery of Advanced Services in support of the Army, the Defense Information Systems Agency and other DoD agencies. She recently retired after a 29year career serving as an Army Signal Officer.

In her final role as a Soldier, she served as the Chief of Staff of the Network Cross Functional Team where she coordinated and synchronized the operations of a matrixed, cross-functional team that developed and executed the Army's Network modernization priorities. Prior to this, Nora served as Division Chief for Force Development -Mission Command Division, Army G-8 for two years. In this role, she developed the Army's investment strategy for a \$19B portfolio supporting information technology, communications, defensive cyber and business systems to enable Army modernization. During 2015-16, she served as a visiting military fellow at The Washington Institute. Nora also commanded the Defense Information Systems Agency, Continental United States

(DISA-CONUS), which is responsible for provisioning, managing and defending the Department of Defense network. Previously, Nora served as the Army's senior communications officer in Japan, where she provided all communications support for U.S. Army Japan and executed bilateral relations with the Japanese Signal and Cyber forces.

Since joining the Army in 1990, she commanded soldiers at the tactical, operational, and strategic levels, deploying twice to Iraq in leadership positions. During her 2009 deployment, she commanded a thousand-Soldier task force with the 3rd Infantry Division near Tikrit.

Nora holds a master's degree in National Security and Strategic Studies from the National War College, an M.B.A. from the Texas A&M University - Central Texas, a bachelor's degree in management from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point and a certificate in National Security Policy Studies from MIT (Seminar XXI). Nora received the AUSA Writing Award while at the War College and the inaugural Art Crowley Award for Servant Leadership in Cisco (Cisco - US Public Sector).



Ambassador Bismarck Myrick (Retired) Board Vice Chair



Ambassador (Ret.) Bismarck Myrick, is Ambassador-in-Residence and Lecturer of Political Science and History at Old Dominion University. He completed a career in the Foreign Service of the U.S. The President twice nominated him to serve as Ambassador (Lesotho 1995; Liberia 1999). He also headed the U.S. Diplomatic Mission in Durban, South Africa -- arriving there in 1990, the year Nelson Mandela was released from 27 years of imprisonment. He later headed the Diplomatic Mission in Cape Town, South Africa. His diplomatic assignments included periods when he served as Dean of the Diplomatic Corps. In addition, he served as Desk Officer for Somalia; chaired an interagency working group on strategic nuclear policy; and, as Deputy Director, managed U.S. security assistance policies for South America and the Caribbean. He earned the Department of State's Superior Honor Award.

He has traveled to over 40 African countries and represented the U.S. at the swearing in of South Africa's first democratic parliament. The Kingdom of Lesotho conferred on him

the Kingdom's highest honor to a non-citizen. Liberia's major newspapers and civil society organizations named him "Diplomat of the Year" or "Man of the Year" for three consecutive years. The City Council appointed him Goodwill Ambassador for Goree Island, Senegal. He was Political Officer in Liberia during the government of Samuel Doe. He completed regular study projects in southern and western Africa: 2006-2014; South Africa, 2015; and, Senegal and South Africa in 2016, 2017, 2018, and 2022.

Ambassador Myrick also completed a career in the U.S. Army. Starting as a private, he rose through the ranks to become a field grade officer. He served in Vietnam, Korea, Japan, Germany and Ethiopia. He earned the Silver Star, two Bronze Stars for heroism in combat, two Bronze Stars for meritorious service in a combat zone, the Purple Heart, Meritorious Service Medal, Parachutist Badge and Combat Infantryman Badge. An Army Foreign Area Officer (Africa Specialist), he was Director of African Studies at the School of International Studies, Fort Bragg, NC. He is in the National Infantry Hall of Fame at Fort Benning, GA. He was the ODU 2011 Veterans Day Honoree and Featured Speaker.

He graduated from the University of Tampa with honors and earned an M.A. degree from Syracuse University. Spelman College awarded him a Doctor of Humane Letters degree. He is co-author of Three Aspects of Crisis in Colonial Kenya; author of "The United States and Liberia" in The African Experience: Past, Present, and Future and author of scores of official documents. Portsmouth, VA, his home town, named two streets in his honor and selected him as a "Portsmouth Notable" – the city's highest honor.

Active in community service, he is on a number of boards, such as the World Affairs Council. The highly respected New Chesapeake Men for Progress Foundation selected him for the 2018 Lifetime Achievement Award. He is married to Marie Pierre Myrick and they live in Chesapeake. His children are Attorney Bismarck Myrick, Jr., Wesley Todd Myrick and Allison Elizabeth Myrick Sanders.

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Dr. DJ Patil



DJ Patil has held a variety of roles in Academia, Industry, and Government. He currently is a board member for Devoted Health, a Senior Fellow at the Belfer Center at the Harvard Kennedy School, and an Advisor to Venrock Partners.

Dr. Patil was appointed by President Obama to be the first U.S. Chief Data Scientist where his efforts led to the establishment of nearly 40 Chief Data Officer roles across the Federal government. He also established new health care programs including the Precision Medicine Initiative and the Cancer Moonshot, new criminal justice reforms including the Data-Driven Justice and Police Data Initiatives that cover more than 94 million Americans, as well as leading the national data efforts. He also has been active in national security and for his efforts was awarded by Secretary Carter the Department of Defense Medal for Distinguished Public Service which is the highest honor the department bestows on a civilian.

In industry, he was CTO for Devoted Health, led the product teams at RelateIQ which was acquired by Salesforce, was founding board member for Crisis Text Line which works to use new technologies to provide on demand mental and crisis support, and was a member of the venture firm Greylock Partners. He also was Chief Scientist, Chief Security Officer and Head of Analytics and Data Product Teams at the LinkedIn Corporation where he co-coined the term Data Scientist. He has also held a number of roles at Skype, PayPal, and eBay.

As a member of the faculty at the University of Maryland, his research focused on nonlinear dynamics and chaos theory and he helped start a major research initiative on numerical weather prediction. As an AAAS Science & Technology Policy Fellow for the Department of Defense, Dr. Patil directed new efforts to leverage social network analysis and the melding of computational and social sciences to anticipate emerging threats to the US. He has also co-chaired a major review of US efforts to prevent bioweapons proliferation in Central Asia and co-founded the Iraqi Virtual Science Library (IVSL). In 2014 he was selected by the World Economic Forum as a Young Global Leader and is also a Member of the Council of Foreign Relations.

Dr. Patil has a Ph.D. in Applied Mathematics from the University of Maryland College Park and a B.A. in Mathematics from UC San Diego.



The Honorable Timothy J. Roemer



Tim Roemer, former U.S. Member of Congress, 9/11 Commissioner, and U.S Ambassador to India, is Executive Director and Strategic Counselor at APCO Worldwide. He works with clients on government relations and provides strategic advice. With his background in international trade, education policy, and national security, Ambassador Roemer is a trusted consensus-builder, problem solver and international expert.

In 2009, he was appointed by President Obama to serve as U.S. Ambassador to India, one of America's largest diplomatic missions. During his time in office, Ambassador Roemer helped move India from being America's 25th largest trading partner to 12th. He oversaw the signing of the Counterterrorism Cooperation Initiative, which broadened U.S. – India coordination in intelligence, homeland security, border security, money laundering, and terrorist financing. He worked with the U.S. Government to assist India on the Global Center for Nuclear Energy Partnership. Ambassador Roemer strengthened U.S. cooperation with India in technology

transfers and sales in the defense and space industries.

Ambassador Roemer was an early endorser of President Obama and President Biden and actively supported both successful campaigns. He has participated regularly in TV interviews with CNN, MSNBC, Bloomberg News, NDTV, IndiaToday, CNBC, Voice of America, and other outlets in which he has spoken on U.S. political issues and international relations. He has contributed numerous articles and op-eds to the Washington Post, New York Times, Wall Street Journal, USA Today, and South Bend Tribune on domestic and international issues.

Earlier, Ambassador Roemer proudly served for 12 years in the United States Congress as Representative for Indiana's 3rd Congressional District. Coming from a family of educators, he fought to improve access, standards, and achievement for American education. He was known for his bipartisan work on getting laws passed and for his insights on the Intelligence Committee. Ambassador Roemer was appointed to serve on the 9/11 Commission and helped pass the Commission's recommendations into law. Later, he was a member of the Washington Institute for Near East Policy's Presidential Task Force on Combating the Ideology of Radical Extremism, the 21st Century National Parks Commission, the Commission on the Prevention of Weapons of Mass Destruction Proliferation and Terrorism, and the 9/11 FBI Review Commission.

Ambassador Roemer is a member of the Aspen Institute's US-India Strategic Dialogue, and a board member of the US India Strategic Partnership Forum (https://usispf.org/). He is also a strategic adviser to Issue One (https://issueone.org/), a non-profit organization working on a bipartisan basis to address safe-guarding and strengthening our democracy. He has traveled around the country to speak on this issue at conferences and public venues. From 2018 to 2021, he has participated in annual U.S.-China Track II Strategic Dialogues, at which leading U.S. and Chinese experts discuss political and economic issues of critical importance to the bilateral relationship.

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He completed his bachelor's degree at the University of California at San Diego. He earned a master's and a doctoral degree in American government from the University of Notre Dame, with his dissertation on: "The Senior Executive Service: Retirement and Public Personnel Policy". Both institutions have recognized his achievements with distinguished alumnus awards.

Ambassador Roemer is married to Sally Johnston Roemer. They have four children, Patrick, Matthew, Sarah, and Grace and live in Great Falls, Virginia and attend St. Thomas à Becket Catholic Church. The Roemers have two rescue dogs named Hoosier and Willie. He collects first edition books and overpriced baseball cards.





General Norton A. Schwartz United States Air Force (Retired) Board Chair



Norton A. Schwartz serves as President of the Institute for Defense Analyses (IDA), a nonprofit corporation operating in the public interest. IDA manages three Federally Funded Research and Development Centers that answer the most challenging U.S. security and science policy questions with objective analysis leveraging extraordinary scientific, technical, and analytic expertise. At IDA, General Schwartz (U.S. Air Force, retired) directs the activities of more than 1,000 scientists and technologists employed by IDA.

General Schwartz has a long and prestigious career of service and leadership that spans over 5 decades. He was most recently President and CEO of Business Executives for National Security (BENS). During his 6-year tenure at BENS, he was also a member of IDA's Board of Trustees.

Prior to retiring from the U.S. Air Force, General Schwartz served as the 19th Chief of Staff of the U.S. Air Force from 2008 to 2012. He previously held senior joint positions as Director

of the Joint Staff and as the Commander of the U.S. Transportation Command. He began his service as a pilot with the airlift evacuation out of Vietnam in 1975.

General Schwartz is a U.S. Air Force Academy graduate and holds a master's degree in business administration from Central Michigan University. He is also an alumnus of the Armed Forces Staff College and the National War College.

He is a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and a 1994 Fellow of Massachusetts Institute of Technology's Seminar XXI. General Schwartz has been married to Suzie since 1981.

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The Honorable Debra S. Wada

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Ms. Wada currently serves as CEO of Senshi Ame Advisors LLC, a government consulting firm that provides strategic advice to corporations and organizations seeking to engage with Congress and the Department of Defense. She also currently serves as the Executive Director for the Uniformed Services Family Health Plan Alliance, a consortium of former public health hospitals that provide health care to military beneficiaries and military retirees. Debra also serves as a Board Member for the Military Child Education Coalition, the Reserve Forces Policy Board, the Army Research Board, and as a Advisory Member to the Service Year Alliance.

In 2017, Debra was appointed to the National Commission on Military, National and Public Service Commission, which was formed to review the Selective Service System and develop recommendations to improve the awareness, aspiration, and access to military, national and public service. From 2014 to 2017, Debra served as the Assistant Secretary of Manpower and Reserves Affairs for the United States Army. As the Assistant Secretary, she effectively managed Army military, civilian and contractor personnel, training and readiness policies, including

health care services, for over 1.2 million soldiers and Army civilians. She oversaw morale, welfare and recreation programs that supported over 2 million Army dependents.

Prior to her appointment by President Obama, Debra spent over 25 years in Congress, including over a decade of experience on the House Armed Services Committee where she served as Deputy Staff Director, Lead Military Personnel Staff, and Professional Staff Member.

Debra graduated from Drake University with a B.A. in Economics and Political Science.

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Lieutenant General Michael T. Plehn United States Air Force 17th President



Lieutenant General Mike Plehn is the 17th President of the National Defense University. As President of NDU, he oversees its five component colleges that offer graduatelevel degrees and certifications in joint professional military education to over 2,000 U.S. military officers, civilian government officials, international military officers and industry partners annually.

Raised in an Army family, he graduated from Miami Southridge Senior High School in 1983 and attended the U.S. Air Force Academy Preparatory School in Colorado Springs, Colorado. He graduated from the U.S. Air Force Academy with Military Distinction and a degree in Astronautical Engineering in 1988. He is a Distinguished Graduate of Squadron Officer School as well as the College of Naval Command and Staff, where he received a Master's Degree with Highest Distinction in National Security and Strategic Studies. He also holds a Master of Airpower Art and Science degree from the School of

Advanced Airpower Studies, as well as a Master of Aerospace Science degree from Embry-

Riddle Aeronautical University.

Lt Gen Plehn has extensive experience in joint, interagency, and special operations, including: Middle East Policy in the Office of the Secretary of Defense, the Joint Improvised Explosive Device Defeat Organization, and four tours at the Combatant Command level to include U.S. European Command, U.S. Central Command, and twice at U.S. Southern Command, where he was most recently the Military Deputy Commander. He also served on the Air Staff in Strategy and Policy and as the speechwriter to the Vice Chief of Staff of the Air Force.

Lt Gen Plehn is a master navigator with 2,200 flight hours in the AC-130H, AC-130U, U-28, MQ-1B, MQ-9, and F-16D. He has more than 350 combat hours supporting operations over Bosnia, Somalia, Haiti, Afghanistan, and Iraq. He has commanded special operations units at the squadron, group, and wing levels, and was formerly the Deputy Commander of Air Force Special Operations Command.

His awards and decorations include the Defense Distinguished Service Medal, Distinguished Service Medal, Defense Superior Service Medal with 2 oak leaf clusters, the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star, Defense Meritorious Service Medal with oak leaf cluster, Meritorious Service Medal with 3 oak leaf clusters, Air Medal with 2 oak leaf clusters, Aerial Achievement Medal with 4 oak leaf clusters, Air Force Commendation Medal, Air Force Achievement Medal with oak leaf cluster, the Gallant Unit Citation, the Medal for Distinguished Service to the Colombian Military Forces and the White Nun Medal for Distinguished Actions to the Army and Republic of Guatemala.

An Eagle Scout and avid reader, he speaks passable Spanish. In their quiet time, Mike and his wife enjoy watching ice hockey and providing staff assistance to their two cats.

Ambassador John Hoover was named the Senior Vice President of the National Defense University (NDU) in June, 2021. Prior to that, he was the Acting Chancellor of the College of International Security Affairs (CISA) at NDU for one year from July, 2020. He is a career member of the United States Senior Foreign Service who began his career with the U.S. Department of State in 1988.

Before arriving at NDU, Hoover served as the Deputy Chief of Mission at the U.S. Embassy in Islamabad, Pakistan from 2017 to 2020. From 2014 to 2017, he served as the U.S. Ambassador to the Republic of Sierra Leone, where he helped lead the U.S. Government's successful response to the world's worst-ever Ebola outbreak. Before that, he was the Director of the Office of Regional and Security Affairs in the State Department's Bureau of African Affairs (2010-2013). Overseas, Hoover has served in Kampala, Uganda as Deputy Chief of Mission (2008-10); Nairobi, Kenya as Economic Counselor (2004-08); Shanghai, China (2000-2004); Taipei, Taiwan

(1996-2000); Mbabane, Swaziland (1989-91); and Paris, France (1988-89).

Hoover is the winner of two global State Department awards: The Herbert Salzman Award for Excellence in International Economic Performance (2008), and the Director General's Award for Reporting (co-winner, 1998). He is the winner of several Superior Honor Awards and received a Presidential Rank Award in 2019. Prior to his Foreign Service career, Hoover worked as an investment banker in New York and Tokyo, and as an English teacher in Japan. He is a 1982 magna cum laude graduate of Princeton University and a native of Acton, Massachusetts. He is married to Kathyrine Sumi Lin Hoover, a former teacher. They are the proud parents of two adult sons.

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Dr. John W. Yaeger Vice President for Accreditation and Strategic Planning



John W. Yaeger, E.D., was appointed National Defense University Vice President for Accreditation and Strategic Planning in September 2020. Prior to that he was Provost since October 2009.

A 1974 graduate of the U.S. Naval Academy, Dr. Yaeger serves today as Class President.

From June 1974 through June 1993 Dr. Yaeger had assignments with naval aviation squadrons and ships, serving as an instructor pilot in each operational assignment. Dr. Bryon Greenwald Deputy Provost



As the NDU Deputy Provost, Dr. Bryon Greenwald continues his life- long service to the nation and the Defense Department. He joined the Joint Forces Staff College after an Army career during which he held a variety of command and staff assignments, including Patriot Air Defense battalion command; Garrison Command of Fort Bliss, Texas; and Chief of Staff, J8, USJFCOM. Dr. Greenwald graduated from the U.S. Military Academy, the U.S. Army Command and General Staff College and School of Advanced Military Studies, and the National War College. He holds M.A. and Ph.D. degrees in history from The Ohio State University.

Dr. Greenwald's interests are in military theory, 20th and 21st Century military history, leading innovation and change, and civil-military relations. He has published extensively in professional journals and is the author of *SCUD ALERT! The History, Development, and Military Significance of Ballistic Missiles on Tactical Operations* (AUSA, 1995) and *The*

Anatomy of Change: Why Armies Succeed or Fail at Transformation (AUSA, 2000). He is currently writing the history of U.S. Army antiaircraft artillery development from 1917-1945. In 2003, he received the National War College Excellence in Writing Award for his study, Understanding Change: An Intellectual and Practical Study of Military Innovation.

In 2005, Dr. Greenwald won the Defense Communities Military Leadership Award for his transformation of the Fort Bliss militarycommunity. The award specifically mentioned his personal leadership of 2,600 military, civilian, and contract employees as they trained, equipped, and deployed over 32,000 personnel; his support of the 2005 BRAC decision-making process (resulting in an additional 30,000 soldiers and over \$4 billion in DoD investment in Fort Bliss); his leadership of the Army Residential Communities Initiative with 3,000 new or renovated military homes; and his partnership with the City of El Paso to build the world's largest inland desalination plant. In 2010 and 2019, he won the JFSC Faculty Recognition of Excellence Award.

Dr. Greenwald has advised 73 JAWS Masters Theses students, including 26 award winners, and mentored 32 students to present papers at international conferences. Besides teaching in the Joint Advanced Warfighting School, he simultaneously served as Interim Dean of Faculty and Academic Programs from March 2012 to September 2013. He created the 13-day JAWS Synthesis Trip to London, France, Belgium, and Germany, led the trip until 2013, and established the JFSC Writing Program. Dr. Greenwald taught the Foundations in the Theory and History of War and the Historical Perspectives on Innovation and Change courses for the Joint Advanced Warfighting School. He is also a member of the National Defense University Research Council and the Joint Force Quarterly editorial board. In 2021, he coordinated the NDU/JFSC hosting of the Society for Military History Conference in Norfolk, Virginia, an enormously complex event that hosted over 600 in-person and virtual participants and held 85 live, virtual, and hybrid panels over three days. His 4-year tenure as an SMH Trustee culminated with the SMH 2021 meeting.

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Dr. James Lepse

Dean of Faculty and Academic Programs, Dwight D. Eisenhower School of National Security and Resource Strategy and Incoming Provost



Dr. James L. Lepse will assume his new position as National Defense University's Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs in early December 2022. He is currently completeing his responsibilities as the Eisenhower Dean of Faculty and Academic Programs, a position in which he has served since June 2018. He previously served as the Eisnhower School's Associate Dean of Faculty and Academic Planning.

As the Eisenhower School's Dean of Faculty and Academic Programs, Dr. Lepse guides the planning, implementation, execution, and evaluation of all academic programs, as well as all matters related to faculty, teaching, engagement, service, professional development, and research. 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Brigadier General Joy Curriera United States Army Commandant, Eisenhower School

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Brigadier General Joy L. Curriera became the Commandant of the Eisenhower School for National Security and Resource Strategy on 25 June 2020. The Eisenhower School prepares selected military officers and civilians from around the world for strategic leadership and success in developing national security strategy and in evaluating, marshaling, and managing resources in the execution of that strategy. As the commandant, General Curriera is responsible for formulating academic policies, supervising curriculum planning, preparation and ensuring excellence in classroom teaching.

Prior to her assignment at the Eisenhower School, Brigadier General Curriera served as the Director of Operations for the Deputy Chief of Staff, G-9 (Installations), Headquarters Department of the Army, Pentagon. As the Director of Operations, Brigadier General Curriera was responsible for overseeing the development and coordination of program requirements, strategy, and policies pertaining to facilities standards, military construction, energy resilience,

real property asset management and BRAC properties that support Army objectives and improve the quality of life for Soldiers, Civilians, and Families.

Brigadier General Curriera graduated from the U.S. Military Academy and received her commission as a second lieutenant in the Army Signal Corps in 1990.

Rear Admiral Mauer is a Philadelphia native and was commissioned via the Villanova University NROTC program. He retired from the Navy in March 2008 after over 31 years of service, which included extensive experience in fleet operations, resource management, technical innovation, Joint Professional Military Education (JPME), interagency coordination, and leading organizational change in NATO and joint commands.

From 2008 to 2011, RADM Mauer was a Group Vice President for Sabre Systems Inc. He was responsible for developing then implementing the corporate strategic plan and managing the Southeast Region's profit and loss operations, its contracts, corporate business development, human resources programs, and Capability Maturity Model Integration (CMMI) level III attainment.
